#### Review 1–10

- Jesus Christ: Christ the emperor, high priest, AΩ, lamb, lion of Judah, Judge, receives worship
- Universality of sin and deception (the horsemen)
  - Rev 9:20–21 ongoing idolatry and sin despite judgment
- The restraint of sin and judgment on sin
  - Lamb judges sin and uses the aspects of Empire to do so
- Cooperation of sin and Satan
- Countering the sin of empire: true worship, witness, and following the lamb (Exodus)

#### Review 1-10

- A cycle of history and Empire
- Visions between letters to churches and New Jerusalem: show how to "conquer" (2:7, 11, 17...)

#### Review 1–10

- 144,000- counted for warfare (cf. Numbers)
- Caligula, Nero, Domitian and Apollo




#### Can I get a Witness? (Ch 11)

# 2 Witnesses (ch. 11)


- Lampstands= universal Church
- Witnesses = content of the Church's witness
  - Moses and Elijah as representatives of the Law and the Prophets (but more than this)
  - Why two witnesses? Judgment in the OT (Num 35:30)
  - Law= God's revelation of truth
  - Prophecy= Application of God's truth
  - The reversal: judgment SAVES 9/10 (power of Lamb's victory)
- The final trumpet: "The kingdom of the world has become the kingdom of our Lord." Really?

#### Woman and Dragon: Ch. 12

- Extended interlude (chs. 12–15)
- Ch. 12 Characters: woman, dragon, Michael, child
  - "Woman" draws on OT imagery of Eve (Gen 3:14–15) and Zion (Isa 66:7–8) as "people of God"
  - Child= Christ
  - Dragon– serpent in garden, Leviathan (and Behemoth), <u>Dacian Draco</u>; ultimately Satan
    - The Leto and Python myth– Apollo dethroned by the crucified Christ








#### The Unholy Trinity: Rev. 13

- Beast from the sea: the imperial power (throne)
- Beast on land: the empire's propaganda

#### <u>Sea Beast</u>

- The wounded head and Nero Redivivus myth
- The seven hills of Rome
- Nero a "beast"– Sybilline Oracles, Philostratus, and Pliny the younger
- 666 (13:18)- Caesar Nero
- The beast "conquers" but so do the martyrs (11:7; 13:12)



#### Battle?: Rev. 14-15


- Contrast of 666 with 144,000
- Expectation of messianic battle
- Militaristic images become images of sacrifice and worship
- The battle is preaching (14:6-13)- proclamation, condemnation, and exhortation
  - Babylon has fallen (14:8)
- Harvest vs. vintage (14:14–20)
  - Anticipating ch. 19 (horses and winepress)

#### Battle?: Rev. 14-15

- Rev. 15 carries forward Exodus imagery (15:2)
  - People waiting to "rest," sea, interpreted Song of Moses (Isa 12)
- Change in Song of Moses:
  - Celebrate nations conversion!
  - Stage 1: Christ's sacrifice redeems people for himself
  - Stage 2: participation in sacrifice through martyrdom brings nations to God

#### Bowls of wrath: Rev. 16

- Carries forward Exodus theme
- Judgment poured on "throne of the beast" (v. 10)
- Empire and demonic power (v. 14)
- Judgments on "Babylon" are complete
- 16–19 focus on destruction of "systems"
- Why Armageddon? (Judges 5:19, 2 Kgs 23:29–30; cf. 2 Chr 35:22; 1 Esd 1:29–31)





# The Harlot (Gorman)

- (Sea beast from Rev 13, imperial power)
- Harlot= exploitative and corrupt economic power
- 1.) Empire is a system that both seduces the powerful with the promise of more power
- 2.) Empire is grand both in terms of territory and ideology
- 3.) Empire presents itself as beautiful
- 4.) Despite its claim to divine status, empire is always ultimately opposed to God's rule

# The Harlot (Gorman)

5.) Empire grows in part because the conquered acquiesce

6.) Empires often die of self-inflicted wounds

7.) Empires... are only short-term manifestations of something much more powerful and permanent than what we may call "Empire"

#### "Come out"- Rev 18

- "Come out"- we exist in the Empire
  - Not "conquer" like the beasts
- The selling of people (18:13)
- The grieving of the nations
- Babylon is always at war with God's kingdom (18:24)

#### The Battle and "the" End

- Contrast with heaven (19:1–2)
- Christ on the white horse (cf. Rev 6)
  - King of kings and Lord of lords
- No battle; victory in Christ's crucifixion and truth
  - "Slain by the sword that came from the mouth"
- John depicts "the end" in many ways
  - Earthquake, harvest, vintage, last battle, marriage supper
  - Emphases on complete destruction of evil

- Clearly fits with and follows 19
- Structure:
  - Satan bound (1000 years)
  - Martyrs reign with Christ (1000 years)
  - Satan released, nations deceived, battle ensues
  - All enemies destroyed (who are they?)
  - Satan tossed into lake of fire
  - Judgment of dead, Death, and Hades

- "Millennium" serves a theological and structural function
- Draws on Daniel 7: destruction of beast and transfer of kingdom to Son of Man and his people
  - Revelation 19:11–21– destruction of beast
  - Revelation 20:4–6– transfer of kingdom

- Culmination of four major themes:
  - (Complete) Victory of God
  - Lordship of Christ
  - Vindication of the martyrs
    - Life and rule of saints contrasted with same of beast
    - 42 months vs. 1000 years!
    - Cannot be deceived again
  - The renewal of creation

- The complete sovereignty of God evidenced in creation
  - Prevents overemphasis on discontinuity in eschatology
  - A new stage that bridges the present and the ultimate future
- BUT!!!...
  - Not a literal period of time
  - Strictly limited to contrast with fate of beast

#### Rev 21-22

- It is new creation, God's Kingdom; Babylon is no more.
- Excludes: sea (chaos; 21:1); death (21:4); mourning (21:4); evil (21:8); temple (21:22); luminaries, yet no night (21:23, 25; 22:5); closed gate (21:25)
- 1. Vision is climax of this book, the NT, and the whole Bible as the story of God and humanity
- 2. "New heaven and new earth" does not mean a destruction of the old, but their transformation.
- 3. Revelation ends with something like a garden-city
- 4. The boundary between heaven and earth is fully removed.

#### Rev 21-22

5.) The absence of those things on the "no-list" is an absence of things which inhibit the true flourishing of humanity before God

6.) This is about eternal bliss, reunion, and reconciliation.

7.) This is a certain hope established in the death and resurrection of Christ the Lamb, which inspires us to four things:

Worship, Mission, Prophecy, Hope

8.) John's reconfiguration of the Godhead to include Christ is certain by these final chapters.
