"TELL THEM ABOUT THE DREAM MARTIN!"

It was blistering hot. People came from all over the nation on buses, trains, vans and on foot. Some cycled from states away to be there. Over 250,000 attended. Preceding the speech were a plethora of speakers and musical performances. The plan was to have King, the highlighted speaker, finish off the day's events with a crescendo. As the day wore on, however, attendees were fading. Some even began leaving before King came to the podium. When it was finally time, King stepped up, looked over the crowd and began, "I am happy to join with you today in what will go down in history as the greatest demonstration for freedom in the history of

our nation." King began with the manuscript, repeating the motion of looking down at his notes and then up at the crowd before him. After he reached a rhythm and tone, however, King slowly moved away from his text. The crowd responded with a swell of cheers. It was at this moment that King's longtime friend and gospel singer Mahalia Jackson enters the scene. Mahalia Jackson had heard King speak about his "dream" before. After sensing the crowd was a little low and knowing how charismatic her friend and leader could be, Jackson leaned in from behind the stage and screamed out to King, "Tell them about the dream, Martin! Tell them about the dream!" It was then that King looked back at Jackson and slowly but purposely slid the written speech to the side. He paused. King's adviser Jones, after seeing this interchange on stage, remembers turning to the person next to him and whispering, "These people out there, they don't know it, but they're about to go to church." The rest is history. On September 15, 1963, two weeks after the March on DC, the 16th Street Baptist Church in Birmingham, Alabama was bombed by white supremacists. Many were injured and four young girls were killed (Addie Mae Collins 14, Cynthia Wesley 14, Carole Robertson 14, and Carol Denise McNair 11). After Kennedy's assassination on November 22, Lyndon Johnson signed the sweeping Civil Rights Act, forbidding discrimination in many areas of life. In 1965, King led the march from Selma to Montgomery, Alabama, in support of black voter registration. Johnson would sign the Voting Rights Act shortly after. On February 21, 1965, Malcom X is assassinated. On April 4, 1968, at 6:01 p.m. King is assassinated on the balcony of the Lorraine Motel in Memphis, Tennessee.

As God's people, let us continue the mission of reconciliation and equity in our own lives. In the words of Mahalia, may we "tell them about the dream!"




