SESSION REPORT From the April 24, 2023 Stated Meeting

During the stated April 24 meeting, the Session acted on the following items:

- Approved Rev. George Jacobs preaching November 19, 2023.
- Approved a portion of the Bicentennial gift to Sumter United Ministries be used to renovate and repurpose the old Jaycee Hut across from Riley Park to become a "warm shelter" and an emergency shelter during storms for the homeless. The remaining gift will be used to provide HVAC for elderly residents in the community.
- Approved the Bicentennial gift to Habitat for Humanity in which a portion of the gift will be used to repair a habitat house that was built 22 years ago by Habitat and First Presbyterian Church. Once the repairs are completed, the home will then be marketed by Habitat to a deserving, qualified buyer. The remainder of the gift will be placed in a Habitat trust to be used as needed.
- Planned extensively the details for the stated quarterly meeting of New Harmony Presbytery that will be held at our church Tuesday, May 16, 2023.

The Session requests that you continue to keep the PNC in your prayers as they search to find the pastor that God has already found for us. As always, we will continue to work to serve the Lord through our church, our community, and our world.





DEDICATION OF SOUTH CAROLINA HISTORICAL MARKER

April 30, 2023





FIRST PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, SUMTER

First Presbyterian Church of Sumter organized in 1823 with five charter members. It was originally part of Harmony Presbytery and was an offshoot of Concord Presbyterian Church. The church's founding preacher was Rev. Isaac R. Barbour. Congregants met at the local Baptist Church and the county courthouse until the first church was built near here in 1830, in what was then the outskirts of Sumterville.

First Presbyterian Church had a second wood frame church built in 1850. The third church was built in 1907 on the corner of Main and Calhoun, just south of the 1850 structure. A fine example of Georgian Revival design, its exposed red brick exterior was later painted white. An education building and chapel, both of similar design, were added in 1957.
