## "He Lives! He Lives! Christ Jesus Lives Today!"

Today our nation is hovering under a foreboding and gloomy cloud of the fear of death as we sense the spread of the Covid-19 virus in our midst and we watch the death toll numbers continue to climb. At times anxiety is palpable. There is a serious sense of mortality that hangs in the air. It is rather like a darkened Pittsburgh day when the sunshine just cannot break through the clouds. It makes me think of Holy Week in a new way. What was it like to stand at the Cross and see the dark and heavy clouds move in; to see the power of death sweep over the barren terrain of the hill of Golgotha—"The Place Of The Skull." It certainly would have been a chilling experience. Watching Jesus being nailed to the Cross and knowing that death was going to be the final outcome would leave one with a haunting feeling of helplessness and despair.

I remember when my first grandfather died when I was ten years old. I did not shed a tear throughout the entire time of visitation or through the funeral service until the casket was carried out of the sanctuary. All of a sudden, death was real to me, and I felt the finality of it. It's sting and pain stabbed me deeply to the core. I wept uncontrollably, barely able to see through my tears to find my way out of the sanctuary. It seemed death had won a dreadful and decisive victory. All seemed lost.

The women who watched Jesus die, along with the men who placed His body in the tomb, felt that same way. With the death of Jesus, all did seem lost. The disciples huddled in the Upper Room in fear "sheltering in place" behind locked doors. Would death be coming to them next?

Thankfully, the Easter morning sunrise revealed that The Son Rise had indeed taken place! The light of truth pierced through the heavy darkness and transformed their souls! Jesus was alive! Because He lives, they (and we also) have new life both now and forever.

The Apostle Paul would later write powerful words regarding Resurrection and what it means for us when he declared that in Christ, "Death is swallowed up in victory. Where O death is your victory? Where O death is your sting? . . . Thanks be to God who gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ!" (I Corinthians 15:54-57) I love proclaiming those triumphant words at the gravesite, for we know that even though "From dust we were taken, and to dust we shall return; one day from the dust we shall rise again!"

I love the passage from the Book of Job (who lived roughly 4,000+ years ago), where Job declares his faith in God's promise of a coming Savior who not only saves our soul, but would one day physically resurrect all who believe unto eternal life. Job (19:25-27) writes, "As for me, I know that my Redeemer lives, and at the last He will take His stand on the earth. Even after my skin is destroyed, yet from my flesh I shall see God; whom I myself shall behold, and whom my eyes will see and not another. My heart faints within me!"

Another favorite resurrection quote that I love is from Lutheran Pastor Kohlbrugge, who wrote, "When I die . . . and someone finds my skull, let this skull preach to him and say, 'I have no eyes, nevertheless I see Him; though I have no lips, I kiss Him; I have no tongue, yet I sing praise to Him with all who call upon His name. I am a hard skull, yet I am wholly softened and melted in His love; I lay here exposed on God's Acre [field], yet I am there in Paradise! All suffering is forgotten! His great love has done this for us when He carried His cross and went out to Golgotha." This Easter Season, let us celebrate and share the Good News of this New Life with others!

I know that many of us (especially those of you who are extroverts!) feel like we are imprisoned; whether quarantined in your house or simply by the extra regulations surrounding your work situation.

I am reminded of the Apostle Paul, who was literally imprisoned in Rome when he wrote the letter to the Philippians. In his letter, which ironically is known as his "most joyful" letter, Paul reminds his dear friends in Christ that:

- He is praying for them.
- He is confident of God's good work in their lives through their every circumstance.
- He is using the opportunity to tell those around him about Jesus.
- Because he is in prison, others have been stepping up and sharing the Gospel! (AMEN!)
- He is praying to be released and he is expecting to survive; but he is also prepared to die, and he is at peace with that.
- He senses the presence of Jesus with him.
- He is confident that God will give him the strength to go through whatever comes his way.

There are many other good lessons as well, but those are a few good examples for us that we can immediately utilize. A few minutes reading through this little letter would be a good investment of time today! Paul would later write to Timothy (II Timothy 2:9) that "he was imprisoned, but the Word of God was not imprisoned." Another translation puts it this way, Paul is "chained, but the Gospel is unchained." That is so true for us today! We are not able to do all that we used to do, but the Gospel is going forth, even in new ways! Praise be to God!

Do we older adults think that all teens share characteristics that justify our dismissive attitude? Do we generalize? Teens do not know what they want. They are self-involved. They do not know anything about real life. What can they possibly teach the rest of us?



Jenna Schwartz is a senior at Bethel Park High School. Her indomitable spirit and faith have led to an enviable, deep, trusting relationship with Jesus Christ.

Jenna was a member of her family's church when she felt a nudge to look elsewhere. Consequently, beginning in her freshman year, Jenna tried different churches. Then, tragically and suddenly in her sophomore year, Jenna's mother died.

Four months after her mother's death, Jenna was on a band trip to Myrtle Beach. She became friends with our own Logan Huwe who invited her to Ruthfred's youth group. From her first time attending, Jenna felt like she belonged. "I absorbed it," Jenna said.

For some people, a tragedy like the sudden passing of one's mother would make them pull away from God, but Jenna drew closer. She not only attends TNT with the high school youth, but she helps out with SWAP (6th – 8th graders) on Sundays. She volunteers at Kids Time on Wednesday evenings and has developed a relationship with her "church grandma" Janet Paterra with whom she texts, meets for coffee, and shares prayers.

Jenna attended the Free Lutheran Youth (FLY) convention last summer, an event she called "life changing." She is close to several families in our congregation and grateful for healthy relationships, even as her own chronic health situation has resulted in surgery and threatened to slow her down.

A good student, Jenna is Head Bethette in the Bethel Park Marching Band and will pursue a degree in occupational therapy at Geneva College this fall. She works at the Chipotle Restaurant near South Hills Village after school and on weekends. When she has time, she likes to knit and draw. A student of the Bible, Jenna is into Bible journaling, where she uses markers and pens to add notes and illustrate passages that are significant to her.

Jenna joined Ruthfred last April as a junior in high school. She is showing us what we should already know. Faith is a gift. It is not the result of education or age. It shows us the glory of God. And it is precious.

# The Cross Was His Own

I typically prefer to write about songs and hymns that are familiar to most Christians, but this month I felt led to make my occasional exception to that rule. Rehearsing in the choir room one Wednesday evening, I was struck by the poignant lyrics of an anthem titled "The Cross Was His Own." They view the life and death of Jesus from a slightly different angle that I have never heard expounded upon before.

They borrowed a bed to lay His head When Christ the Lord came down; They borrowed the ass in the mountain pass For Him to ride to town. He borrowed the bread when the crowd He fed On the grassy mountain side, He borrowed the dish of broken fish With which He satisfied.



He borrowed a room on His way to the tomb The Passover Lamb to eat; They borrowed a cave for Him a grave, They borrowed a winding sheet.

These are the words in the arrangement by Edward Broughton that the choir will sing on April 1st. It's pretty obvious that the theme here is how much borrowing went on in the life of the Savior. I was thinking how there are other examples of borrowing that could be listed when a Google search revealed that the anonymous poem actually has a third verse prior to "borrowing a room."



He borrowed the ship in which to sit To teach the multitude; He borrowed a nest in which to rest – He had never a home so rude.

Starting with a borrowed stable for His birth, the incarnated Son of the Almighty God who created all that exists chose to live in poverty, apparently owning nothing more than the clothes on His back and the sandals on His feet. Throughout His ministry He depended on borrowing from friends and even strangers. The verses listed above are not actually complete, however. Each one ends with the following refrain:

But the crown that He wore and the Cross that He bore Were His own – The Cross was His own.

Technically, one might argue that the crown and cross were also borrowed. Yet I believe what the poet was saying is that no one else but Jesus could accomplish our atonement and in that sense the crown and cross were His—and His alone. Returning to the theme of borrowing, it is generally considered good policy to return what is borrowed if that is at all possible. The last thing that was borrowed on Jesus' behalf was His grave. However, He was able to return that after using it for just a couple of days. Alleluia – He is Risen!
