From the Pastor's Desk

Happy Easter, from the Somber Side!

Sitting here at the start of Holy Week, it's challenging to write for the April edition of the Herald, addressing you as you celebrate the joyous Easter Season. Nevertheless, Happy Easter! He is risen, indeed!

How wonderful is the Easter Season? I'll remind you about that from here, on the somber side of Holy Week, in case you've forgotten. The weather is colder here. Today's low was 37. Choosing hymns for services in the Lenten season, we're careful not to use hymns containing the word "Hallelujah." We intentionally worship with a more somber tone during Lent, in remembrance of the sufferings and death of our Messiah on our behalf.

Many other things around us now set a somber tone to the Lenten season, preparing our hearts for the joys of Easter. Pastor Carlson and I wear black robes for Lenten services. We're preparing this week for Good Friday services, which remind us of the intense suffering and excruciating death Jesus endured for us. The trees have no leaves, the grass isn't as green, and most flowers aren't yet blooming. Cinders, dust, and dirt lie on streets, the shoulders of roads, and on sidewalks; lingering evidence of the ice, snow, and slush against which we recently battled. The days are still a little shorter than they eventually will be, and tax bills are coming due.



On my way into church one day this week, however, I snapped this photo. It may still be the somber Lenten Season here on this side of Holy Week, but the daffodils in our Patterson Road flower beds at Ruthfred seem eager to remind us that a wonderful, happy, and beautiful season is approaching. Beneath the shadow of the cross atop Ruthfred's spire, up from the ground, they arose!

Of course, as I typed that sentence, I thought of the tune and words to the old Robert Lowry hymn, *Christ Arose!* Go to Youtube and type "Robert Lowry *Christ Arose,*" and you'll find it there, if it isn't familiar to you. It's an incredibly popular hymn in the little, rural AFLC churches out in the Midwest, with a not-so-faint gospel tone.

The refrain says, "Up from the grave He arose! With a mighty triumph o'er His foes! He arose a victor from the dark domain, and He lives forever with the saints to reign! He arose! He arose! Hallelujah, Christ arose!" Even just listening to that hymn on Youtube from here, on the somber side of Holy Week, brings tears to my eyes. And that third stanza; wow! "Death cannot keep its prey, Jesus my Savior; He tore the bars away, Jesus my Lord!"

These little signs of the seasons, and these small, intentional things we do in our corporate worship, which combine o create a more somber atmosphere and mindset during Lent, are reminders to us of the far greater accomplishments, and far more amazing events that took place at the cross and in that tomb some 2,000 years ago, outside the city of Jerusalem.

Every rotten thing you've ever done, said, or thought; every life-threatening danger you've ever faced (whether resulting from illness, disease, crime, combat, or disaster of any kind), has had the potential of destroying not only your temporal body, but also your eternal soul.

Through His miraculous resurrection from the dead on Easter Sunday, God reveals to you not only that your Savior has the power to conquer physical death itself, but that His sufferings and death on that cross were accepted by God as full payment for every one of your sins, and have won eternal salvation for your soul! As I said in my sermon on Sunday, March 28th, read Isaiah 53! Read the chapter of Isaiah that synagogues across the world IGNORE, and SKIP when they read from the Book of Isaiah! In that chapter; which is only twelve short verses, you'll read about what Jesus accomplished for you on that cross, where, "...He poured out Him self to death, and was numbered with the transgressors; yet He Himself bore the sin of many, and interceded for the transgressors (that's you)."

A Blessed and Happy Easter to you, Ruthfred Lutheran Church! Your Savior, Jesus, has risen indeed! ...and is coming again...

Song of the Month

Now Let the Vault of Heaven Resound

Lyrics: Paul Zeller Strodach Melody: Lasst Uns Erfreuen

Since coming to RLC almost eleven years ago, I have often been drawn into conversations about how we must not say or sing "Alleluia" during Lent. There always seems to be some ambiguity about where or how this practice originated. Was it just a nice tradition that Pastor Dennis had started? So I did a little research. Seems omitting alleluia's during the six weeks of Lent goes back as far the fifth century in the western church, and became even more established during the Middle Ages. "Alleluia" comes from the Hebrew words 'Hallelu Yah' which means "Praise the Lord". Since Lent was designed to be a season of penitence and contemplation of Jesus' passion, it was thought that such an exclamation of joyful praise was not appropriate.

Now that another season of Lent is behind us and the glorious Easter season is here, one hymn that excels in re-introducing Alleluia's into our worship is "Now Let the Vault of Heaven Resound". Maybe that title doesn't really ring a bell with you, but I think if you take a look at hymn #103 in our SBH you'll recognize it. Maybe if I mention that this popular melody is also used for "All Creatures of Our God and King" and "Ye Watchers and Ye Holy Ones" it will help to bring it to mind. All three hymns make use of "Alleluia" in the refrain. The melody is known as "Lasst Uns Erfreuen", German for "Let us rejoice!". It first appeared in a Catholic hymnal in Cologne Germany in 1623, edited by a Jesuit priest, Friedrich Spee. He is sometimes credited with the composition of "Lasst Uns Erfreuen", but this is apparently not known for certain.



Now let the vault of heaven resound In praise of Love that doth abound; Christ hath triumphed, alleluia; Sing, choirs of angels, loud and clear, Repeat their song of glory here, Christ hath triumphed, Christ hath triumphed! Alleluia, alleluia, alleluia.

The lyrics for this hymn were written by Paul Zeller Strobach. Not much biographical information is available for Paul. We do at least know that he was educated at Muhlenburg College in Allentown, PA, and the Lutheran Theological Seminary in Philadelphia. A phrase that re-occurs multiple times throughout the verses is "Christ hath triumphed!" The word "triumph" even occurs a couple more times in variations of that theme. Triumph implies overcoming in a struggle. Since Jesus was (is) God incarnate, was his triumph over sin, death, and the devil a predetermined, foregone conclusion? Or was it a true struggle? That is probably another divine mystery that we may never know the answer to, but it brings to mind a passage from my favorite Christian apologist, G.K. Chesterton: "That a good man may have his back to the wall is no more than we knew already; but that God could have his back to the wall is a boast for all insurgents forever. Christianity is the only religion on earth that has felt that omnipotence made God incomplete. Christianity alone has felt that God, to be wholly God, must have been a rebel as well as a king. Alone of all creeds, Christianity has added courage to the virtues of the Creator."

Christ hath triumphed! Alleluia!

Catching up with Council . . .

Ruthfred Lutheran Church Council Meeting Highlights March 8, 2021



Council voted to grant \$500 to each Kate Wholey and Jenna Schwartz to help with the costs of a two month mission trip this summer to Paraguay. The girls attended the benevolence committee meeting and did an impressive presentation about their trip.

Pastor Carlson shared how grateful he is that the church has persevered over the challenges that the Covid 19 pandemic has presented. He hopes to start a new members class and a training class for small group leaders after the Easter season.

The Trustees discussed plans to move forward with new cabinets for the kitchen. Council voted to accept a bid from Aquaguard to install a basement window in the parsonage. This would bring the house up to code with two ways to exit the basement.

Bill Ward was unable to attend but sent an email further explaining that the January shortfall was due to a lump sum attributed to health care for the year and due to snow removal.

Dave Compel made council aware that the music cannot be heard when the contemporary service is live streamed. Viewers only hear the vocals. A motion was passed to upgrade the sound system to add inputs in the altar area which would reduce the obstacles for the pastors during the service, such as wires and amplifiers. Kurt Zeigler pointed out that the current system is eight years old already. The contemporary service will be live streamed each month.

Pete Huwe reported that the Youth Ministry Director committee is in the process of conducting first interviews with five people. The committee will move forward with second interviews soon. The committee hopes to narrow down the search to the top candidates by the beginning of April to allow the new director to work with Brandon before he leaves.

A motion was passed to form an office manager search committee consisting of Pastor Carlson, Pastor McMinn, Joe Roman, Brian Schmidt, Becky Evans and Kris Wente.

We are looking for someone to organize the church picnic on August 8th. Mario and April Blackston are expecting a new baby later this summer and will not be organizing the picnic this year.

Praise in the Park was rescheduled from August 14th to August 21st.

Pastor Carlson closed in prayer and Joe adjourned the meeting at 8;47. Respectfully submitted,
