From the Pastor's Desk

"Your grief will be turned into joy!" -John 16:20



As I write this we've recently had our last Wednesday evening service of the 2023 Lenten season and are anticipating Holy Week, to culminate in a joyous celebration of our Savior's resurrection on Easter Sunday. Appropriately, given that it's still Lent as I write this, it's raining.

To those of us who aren't farmers, and who never have been, it can seem odd to thank God for rain. To us, rain can be inconvenient, causing us minor griefs like a wet walk or drive to work or class, canceled sporting events, practices, and outings with friends and family. But even those of us who aren't farmers love and appreciate green grass and beautiful, blooming flowers and trees. So, with some reluctance and despite the minor griefs and inconveniences, we thank God for the rain (and even intermittent snowfalls this time of year), anticipating with joy to the rewards we'll soon receive from a healthy (if at times inconvenient) amount of precipitation.

This particular time of the Church year, the end of Lent, anticipating Holy Week and Easter, is similar. Lent is a somber season focused on the suffering and death of our Savior, Jesus Christ. We remember what He endured to rescue us from the guilt of our sin. Lent is a time to focus on repentance, and what it cost our Savior, God's Son, to reconcile us with the Father. Lent's focus on repentance of sin and the suffering and death of our Savior can cause us grief.

That grief continues through Holy week to the end of our Tenebrae service on Good Friday, as we leave the darkened sanctuary, the cross draped in black, reflecting upon Christ's death on the cross. We leave that service quietly, reverently, honoring our Savior for His suffering and death on our behalf. As we leave that service, there's grief in our heart for what He endured.

But we somberly leave the sanctuary on Good Friday in anticipation of the amazing, joyous transformation we'll witness when we re-enter the sanctuary on Easter Sunday! On Easter Sunday the sanctuary will have been transformed, filled with light, beautiful flowers, celebratory music, and the miraculous message of the Gospel; the resurrection of our Lord, Jesus Christ, from the dead! We'll open our service on Easter Sunday, joyously proclaiming, "He is risen!" It's then, on Easter Sunday, when the grief and tears of the somber Lenten season are turned into joy by the light of the Gospel!

While the rain is falling, the trees are bare, the nights are still cold, and it's still Lent, our minds and hearts can be overwhelmed with grief and sadness. We think of our sin, the depth of our guilt, of our own responsibility for and contribution towards His suffering and death on the cross, and, Lord willing, we feel a sense of conviction,



Bob & Gladys Reith

During a call committee process at a former church, the pastoral candidate made a statement I will not forget. He suggested that the DNA of a church cannot be changed. What is Ruthfred's DNA? I knew Bob and Gladys Reith could tell me.



The couple has been married for nearly seventy years. They have been Bethel Park residents since they built their home in 1958 and there was still a farm across from their residence on Logan Road. Their four children, Susan, Janet, Linda, and David were raised at the church. Susan Swan, married to Tom, and Janet Pacich, married to Ed, are still members.

The Reiths met in New York City at the U.S. Steel Corporation. Gladys was employed as a secretary. Bob worked there for the summer. From German Lutheran background, Bob's father was a talented church musician playing several instruments leading to Bob's training as a trumpet player, a skill he has shared widely over the years. Gladys recalls how difficult it was to be German during World War II. Her grandmother was fearful their ethnicity would mark them as Nazi sympathizers, (which they were not).

Bob and Gladys were married in 1953. Two years later, Bob enlisted in the U.S. Navy. Afterward, he was employed by U. S. Steel which took him to Pittsburgh. Our long-time church member, Andy Kovac, connected the Reiths to a building lot. They had plans to construct a new house without a general contractor. They broke ground on September 1 and moved on December 15, 1958.

A "lady with an apple pie", AKA their neighbor, Ida Mae Collins, introduced the family to our church. Ida Mae had a strong reputation as a Bible scholar with a kind spirit. At that time, the sanctuary was only the tiny chapel at the rear. There was a much larger, better-established church nearby. But then, it wasn't like Ruthfred. "Loving and caring unlike any other" is how Gladys describes Ruthfred. She and Bob agree that there was a "top-down" congenial hospitality that flowed from Pastor Dennis and trickled down to everyone in the church. Whether sharing pie and coffee or tears of sorrow, the members were family to one another. It was true then and is still true today. It is half of the DNA. The second half of the DNA concerns the Word of God. There was once a vicar (intern) from Pastor Dennis' alma mater, Capital University, well before the American Lutheran Church (ALC) merged with the Lutheran Church in America (LCA), who believed the Bible "contained the Word of God" but was not inspired or inerrant. This debate is still prominent in Christian churches today, but Ruthfred has always been confident in the inerrancy of Scripture.

As members for over 60 years, Bob and Gladys have served in just about every capacity from teaching Sunday School to singing in the choir, playing trumpet, serving on the church council, the Board of Elders, and so much more. In fact, I would not be writing this monthly column had Bob, as editor of *The Herald*, not asked me many years ago.

Our weekly bulletin used to print the words, *The light at the corner of South Park and Patterson Roads*. Bob and Gladys pray that Ruthfred will continue as the loving, Biblical church to the community that it has always been to them.



Song of the Month

The Strife Is O'er

Lyrics: Original Latin unknown

Tr. by Francis Pott

Music: Giovanni Pierluigi da Palestrina

Alleluia! Alleluia! Alleluia!
The strife is o'er, the battle done;
Now is the Victor's triumph won;
Now be the song of praise begun,
Alleluia!

So goes the first verse of the hymn that appears first in the Easter section of our SBH hymnal. The original lyrics of "The Strife Is O'er" were in Latin and the author is unknown. The English words we know and love were translated from the Latin by Francis Pott in 1861. The lyrics were then set to music using an existing melody called "Victory" which was composed by 16th century musician and composer Giovanni Pierluigi da Palestrina who "had a long-lasting

influence on the development of church and secular music in Europe, especially on the development of counter point." (Wikipedia) The "Alleluia's" in the hymn were not actually part of the original melody, but added later by William Henry Monk.

Perhaps "The Strife Is O'er" was selected to be the first hymn in the Easter section because it focuses, at least initially, on the battle victory aspect of Jesus' life and final passion. The Bible provides us enough information about that final passion, and we know enough about crucifixion, that not much needs to be left to our imagination. And if there is any doubt about the agonies Jesus had to face, we only need to look to the Garden of Gethsemane where he sweat drops of blood pleading with the Father whether this "cup" could be removed.

As we know, the cup of suffering was not removed. In his final moments on the cross we hear Jesus cry, "It is finished!" According to Luke, he also uttered "Father, into your hands I commit my spirit." I think we can assume that that was the moment when the "strife was o'er", "the battle done!". Here, however, is where our imagination may perhaps be allowed to roam a bit. Other than a cryptic verse in I Peter about Jesus going to preach to spirits in prison, the Bible is silent about Jesus' spirit between Friday afternoon and Sunday morning.

We've all experienced that sweet feeling of relief after an illness, like that 24-hour stomach virus that has been going around, for example; or following a clean bill of health after a more serious health challenge; or when an unpleasant task has finally been completed and is behind us. Magnify those feelings by orders of magnitude beyond our comprehension and perhaps we can come close to what Jesus experienced after those final words on the cross. Thinking about this reminded me of the following devotional poem by Max Lucado that I had read many years ago:

The Son is out.


It's over.

COUNCIL MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

March 13, 2023

Elders: The Elders will be helping with Confirmation training and Adult Sunday School after Pastor Carlson's resignation.



<u>Sunday School</u>: Sunday School teachers participated in the first session of the Ministry Safe child protection training. Plans are to hold another session for Council members at the April Council meeting.

<u>Trustees</u>: Council approved payment of the \$2250 bill for the RotoRooter work done in the parking lot. The municipality paid the other half.

<u>Personnel:</u> Mason Mitchell's temporary full-time Youth Director term and salary were finalized for approval. He will serve from May 15 to August 7, 2023.

Other Business:

The Direction Committee was formed to study trends or changes to the church's financial position, evaluate staff and pastoral duties, workload, job descriptions and to explore options/alternatives for a second pastor. Bill Ward will prepare a formal charter for the committee's work. Council approved establishment of the committee with members Bill Ward, Rich Kleiser, Mark Killinger, Dan Groves, and Chris Stout.




