# A Chaotic and Disappointing Christmas is transformed into A Christmas of Joy and Peace by the Birth of the Christ-Child

I'm sure that Mary and Joseph were looking forward to spending their first Christmas together at home by the fire in the comfort of their own house with family and friends. (Yes, I know there was no "Christmas" before Christ was born, but for the sake of this article bear with me!) But a new mandate came down from the government demanding that everyone had to go to their city of origin for the new census (which probably was for the purpose of new taxes!). They could not just mail it in, or go on line to register. They had to physically journey to their ancestoral home. It would certainly not be convenient to say the least! Life under the Romans was difficult! It must have been hard to not feel helpless in the face of systemic abuse of power, unrealistic governmental decrees, and violent oppression.

He retired from St. John Evangelical Lutheran in Carnegie. Annie spent much of her childhood at church and went on to graduate from Thiel College with a degree in Art Education.

Jason was raised Roman Catholic, and attended parochial school from grades 4 through 9. Yet, he does not think he truly had much faith until much later in his adult years. Although Jason works for Main Street Renovations, his passion is music. Annie calls him a "musical genius" for his abilities in composition, guitar and banjo. Lebanon United Methodist Church where their mother works as the lead older toddler teacher (and this


#### Song of the Month

#### Joy to the World, the Lord Is Come

Lyrics by Isaac Watts Music by George F. Handel; Lowell Mason

Suppose I were to ask you to name only two songs or hymns that most fully say "Christmas



The lyrics for "Joy" were composed by Isaac Watts. As noted in another article of this series, Isaac was a prolific hymn poet. Interestingly, this hymn was never intended for just the Christmas season. It is based more on Psalm 98 and Genesis 3 than on anything in the New Testament nativity narratives. To be more exact, it is based on a paraphrase of Psalm 98 fromWatts' own "The Psalms of David, Imitated in the Language of the New Testament".

The author of Psalm 98 celebrates how God has done marvelous things, worked salvation with his right hand and his holy arm, revealed his righteousness in the sight of the nations, and remembered his steadfast love and faithfulness. For these things he calls upon all the earth to make a joyful noise to the Lord with singing and all sorts of instrumentation. He even calls for the sea, rivers, and hills to join in.

Joy to the world! the Saviour reigns; Let men their songs employ, While fields and floods, rocks, hills and plains Repeat the sounding joy.

The Psalmist also confidently looks forward to the day when the Lord will come to judge the world with righteousness and the people with equity. He was inspired to write this without the benefit of knowing any details about the redemptive life, death, and resurrection of Jesus. We Christians living in the 21<sup>st</sup> century have the advantage of looking back at Jesus' first coming and can sing "Joy to the world, the Lord is come." How much more confidently can we look forward to Jesus' second coming when "thorns will no longer infest the ground".

Shifting attention to the musical aspect of this hymn, I noticed that our SBH hymnal gives credit to Lowell Mason while my old LCMS hymnal lists George F. Handel as the composer. So which is it, I wondered. Turns out it's a bit complicated (as most things in real life are, right?). Lowell Mason was an American music educator who did indeed arrange the popular melody we know so well, but he did so by borrowing musical phrases from Handel's "Messiah". Hence the attributions to both. Ironically, while Watts and Handel resided in London, Mason's tune "remains virtually unknown in Great Britain." (www.umcdiscipleship.org)

Lutherans are noted for singing hymns in harmony. My research for "Joy to the World" has helped me to understand why this hymn is particularly fun, especially for tenors and basses. "When sung to Antioch [name given to Mason's melody], the text is repeated in the second section, reflecting a particular early American treatment of the melody called a 'fuging tune'. A fuging tune was a compositional device initiated by American-born composer William Billings (1746-1800) where voice parts enter one after the other in rapid succession, usually repeating the same words." 
For everyone who participated in "Reading Through the Bible" this year, we pray it was a blessing for you. Thanks once again to Don Roose for spearheading this program for our congregation!
