From the Pastor's Desk

Devoted to Teaching, Fellowship, Breaking of Bread, & Prayers

It's been nearly a year since many folks have been to their church, and not just members of Ruthfred. Many churches in the area have shut their doors for nearly a year, going far beyond even CDC guidelines, and have yet to re-open.

Thanks be to God, this has not been the case at Ruthfred! Members of Ruthfred, including our Re-entry Committee, have worked hard to make Ruthfred a safe, enjoyable, and lively place for people to come and worship. Our online ministries have expanded with livestreamed services, and people have come to Ruthfred in-person and online from other congregations, other towns, and other states to worship with us.

In the last few weeks in January more families have come to Ruthfred. People we've never met have heard from others around the community that Ruthfred's doors are open, and worship is happening here. Two new families brought their children to the children's choir practice this Wednesday because their own congregations have yet to offer children's activities again. In the meantime, by the grace of God, through the devotion of many loving volunteers, teachers, and hard workers at Ruthfred, our ministries have continued. This has not gone unnoticed in Southwestern Pennsylvania.

Please pray for these families. Pray that they and others in the area who long to worship the Lord will find a home here at Ruthfred, in a congregation that's devoted to the teaching of God's Word, to Christian fellowship, the breaking of bread, and prayer.

Speaking of the breaking of bread, if it's been a while since you've had Communion, and you haven't been to Ruthfred in a while, please contact Pastor Carlson, Pat Lutz, or me. Schedule a time to come to Ruthfred for a private Communion service, or even a time for Pastor Carlson or me to come to your home and bring you Communion.

Since I started at Ruthfred in June, I've served Holy Communion to Ruthfred members on their front porches, privately in my office, in hospitals, privately in Ruthfred's chapel,

privately in Ruthfred's sanctuary, in the homes of many members, and this past week I even had Holy Communion on a street corner in Canonsburg in 13-degree temperatures. Pastor Carlson and I always wear a mask and gloves to administer the Sacrament, providing a safe way for you to have the priceless gift of the Lord's Supper.

If you live in a facility that doesn't allow visitors, but does allow trips to the grocery store, I'll meet you in the grocery store parking lot. I'll meet you in the driveway or parking garage of the facility where you live. I'll come to your home and pass you Communion through your screen door, an open window, over the hood of your car, or over the top of your grocery cart. There's absolutely no reason for you to be kept from the Lord's Table. Pastor Carlson and I will bring Holy Communion to you in whatever conditions necessary.

During war, chaplains served Holy Communion on battlefields with bullets flying by and mud up to their ankles. By God's grace, I'm sure Pastor Carlson and I can manage to serve you Holy Communion in a Walmart parking lot, if necessary. Pastor Carlson and I own coats. We're not afarid of the cold, nor are we afraid of administering the Sacrament in unusual places. As a matter of fact, YOU are a great encouragement to us when you allow us to bring the Sacrament to you, especially in challenging circumstances.



We're here for you, and we'll go where you need us to go and do what we need to do to bring the Lord's Supper to you.

Call us at (412) 835-7140 and speak to Pastor Carlson or me to schedule a private Communion service today. Please say a prayer for your brothers and sisters in Christ and their families who've been shut out of their churches for so long now. Pray that they'll come to Ruthfred and find a home here!

A special thanks to those of you who've returned to Ruthfred to worship in-person again, even with the masks. Your presence is a deep encouragement to the family of Faith, and to Pastor Carlson and me. Your absence is felt. If it's been a while since you've visited Ruthfred, come back for a visit. If you're not ready to join us for a corporate worship service yet, but would still like to come into the church privately to pray, call us and let us know. Our doors are open. You can just come, sit, and pray in the chapel or in the

sanctuary alone if you'd like. Pastor Carlson or I can be there with you and hold a private prayer or Communion service with you.

If you've been thinking about it, wondering when would be a good time, here's your answer. NOW is a good time. "Behold, now is the acceptable time. Behold, now is the Day of Salvation." -2 Corinthians 6:2

You are welcome here at Ruthfred. Stop in for a visit. If it's been a while, we miss you! Read Hebrews 10:23-25, then pray, and then pick up the phone and give us a call, or e-mail me at pastormcminn@ruthfred.org.

Andrew Vogel

Many families watch their children go off to college, never to return as adult members of Ruthfred. But that is not the case for Andrew Vogel. Not only did he return as a member, but as a part time employee as well. Andrew's parents are well known at the church. His father, Bob, is the director of both the senior and bell choirs. His mother Lynn, grand-parents Wilbert and Alma, Aunt Norma and Sister Jennifer are all active members.

When Andrew attended Grove City College, he never knew Cassie Rummel, to whom he is now engaged to be married. They met two years ago and are planning their big event for August. Cassie is from Ligonier where her family resides on several wooded acres. She works for UPMC as a recruiter.

God Himself Is Present

Lyrics by Gerhard Tersteegen Music by Joachim Neander God himself is present,
Let us now adore him,
And with awe appear before him!
God is in his temple,
All within keep silence,
Prostrate lie with deepest reverence.

If you are an alumna or alumnus of catechism instruction, you probably learned that one of God's attributes is that He is omnipresent – "present everywhere". Yet Scripture sometimes describes places or ways in which God chooses to manifest His presence more specifically. There was the space between the cherubim on top of the Ark of the Covenant. (Exodus 25) There was the temple built by King Solomon. (I Kings 8) Jesus taught his disciples that "where two or three are gathered in my name, there am I among them." (Matthew 18) Later Paul was inspired to write that we ourselves are God's temple and that God's Spirit dwells within us. (I Corinthians 3)

I believe it was in this vein of thought that the hymnist composed "God Himself Is Present". This well known hymn that has stood the test of time enjoins us to remember to be in awe of God's special presence when "two or three" of us gather in our RLC sanctuary. The first verse even talks about lying prostrate with deepest reverence. We don't typically do that in our culture, but if God were to reveal Himself in a way that He did to Ezekial, for example, I suspect we might fall on our faces like Ezekial did! I'm reminded also of what the soldiers and Sanhedrin officers did in the Garden of Gethsemane when Jesus identified himself.



"God Himself Is Present" comes down to us from two men in the German Reformed Pietist tradition. The melody came first, courtesy of Joachim Neander. After a typical rowdy life as a student, Neander came under the influence of Theodore Under-Eyck, a pastor who identified as a Pietist. Under-Eyck inspired young Joachim to get serious about his faith, and he even went on to serve under his mentor as an unordained assistant. In addition to his various duties, Neander composed some 60 hymns, including melodies for some of them. This feat is

even more impressive when you realize that he was born in 1650 and died in 1680 – a mere thirty years!

The lyrics for Neander's melody didn't come until decades later. Gerhardt Tersteegen was born in 1697, 17 years after Neander's passing. He also was brought up in the Reformed Church of Germany, but because of his strong pietistic and even mystical leanings, remained on the outskirts of the organized church. In addition to his teaching, preaching, writing, and personal charity towards the poor, Tersteegen composed 111 hymns. "Inner union of the soul with God and Christ, the childlike simplicity and trust which this brings, renunciation of the world and of self, and daily endeavor to live as in the presence of God

and in preparation for the vision of God, are the keynotes of his hymns. To his intense power of realizing the unseen, his clear and simple diction, and the evident sincerity with which he sets forth his own Christian experience, his hymns owe much of their attraciveness and influence." [hymnary.org]

As I was doing research for this article I stumbled upon a very inspirational YouTube video. Accompanied by a piano arrangement titled "God Himself Is Present with Pachelbel's Canon", the video displays beautiful pictures of all kinds of Christian houses of worship from all over the world, from humble country churches to magnificent cathedrals to campground chapels. Superimposed on the pictures are lyrics from the hymn and various passages from Scripture. Here is the link if you would like to check it out:

Ruthfred Lutheran Church Council Meeting Minutes December 14, 2020



This meeting was held via Zoom. President Joe Roman brought the meeting to order at 7:30 p.m. Pastor McMinn began the meeting with a Bible study and an opening prayer.

The November 9th council meeting minutes were approved in a motion by Kurt Ziegler and second by Gary Fischer. The motion passed unanimously.

Pastor Carlson gave praise for the presentation of the 2021 Annual Budget to the congregation, the Thanksgiving Day service, the new members joining our church, our strong youth ministry, JTTW, Adult Sunday School, our Bible Reading 2021 project, and the Young Adult Group. He did state that we have a shortfall of Shepherds and that Patricia Lutz is working to find those who are willing to participate in the Shepherd ministry. Your participation would be welcome. Finally, grateful thanks was given to each of the church staff members. We are truly blessed by their dedication to Ruthfred.

Pastor McMinn gave a report highlighting his growing duties while spreading God's love and offered a heartwarming encounter while sharing his faith.

The Treasurer's report given by Chuck Morrison emphasized that although we are well positioned with our cash balance due to next year's budget it will be a stretch. He asks that the congregation prayerfully adjust their giving wherever possible.

Kurt Ziegler moved to accept the slate of nominees for positions in the upcoming January election and was second by John Welsh. The motion was approved unanimously.

Will Charlton made a motion to use plastic cup for communion during the pandemic. Following discussion, the motion was second by Gary Fisher and passed unanimously.

The Altar Guild requested purchasing artificial door wreaths and greenery after the holidays as a long-term savings. A motion was made by Will Charlton to purchase 17 wreaths and the greens for the sanctuary windows. John Welsh second the motion and the motion was

approved unanimously.

Closing prayer was given by Pastor Carlson and Joe adjourned the meeting at 8:55 p.m.

Lenten Season 2021

Living the New Life in the Light of the Shadow of the Cross

The Apostle Peter addresses his letter of I Peter, "to those who reside as aliens, scattered throughout" and "who are chosen [and] ... born again to a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead, ..."



The Apostle is writing to the first century church which is made up of Christians who have been "scattered" both because of persecution and also in order to share the Gospel. Peter reminds them that they are "aliens" in this world because Christians are, foremost of all, citizens of the Kingdom of God and heaven is the true home of all believers. But, in the meantime, Peter wants to make sure that Christians live out their new life in Christ, in the light of the cross. It was at the cross that Christians were saved and through the Good News of the cross we come to life. At the cross we also die to our old nature and live for Christ. This new life is a life lived out in the light of the shadow of the cross. This seems strange to us, but the cross does cast a shadow upon who we are and all that we do; however, it is a shadow of light which shines into the darkness of our world.

This Lenten Season we will journey with the Apostle Peter as he writes to the early church and to us about living as a witness for Christ in a dark world. Peter knows that his time was drawing short, as he will be executed, crucified upside down on a cross within a few short years. How is one a faithful follower, a disciple of Jesus, one who lives the way of the cross? Join us (and Peter) this Lenten Season.

Feb. 24th - Living Stones of New Life. (I Peter 2:1-20)

Mar. 10th - Speaking out for the cause of Christ in this New Life. (I Peter 3:8-17)

Mar. 17th - Loving like Christ in this New Life. (I Peter 4:1-11)

Mar. 24th – Serving like Christ in this New Life. (I Peter 5)
