From the Pastor's Desk

"Staying Connected Through Life's Transitions"



On Sunday, December 19th Erin, the kids, and I were blessed to use one of my last vacation days of 2021 to attend a worship service at First Trinity Lutheran Church, a Missouri Synod (LCMS) congregation in Oakland with Connor and Kate Wholey! Don and Barb Roose, whose daughter (Ashley) was married by Pastor Doug Spittel at First Trinity, also joined us.

Connor (a senior at CMU) and Kate (a freshman at Pitt) had never visited First Trinity. Finding a new congregation with whom to worship, and getting actively involved in the ministries of that congregation, are difficult challenges for people experiencing life transitions. Whether moving away from home (and your home church) because of a career change, retirement, college (as in

Connor's & Kate's case), marriage, or other life milestoness, those transitions and their accompanying challenges can easily cause us to lose contact with the family of Faith.

Erin and I have some experience with that. When I moved away from home in Lancaster, PA to attend Pitt in 1997, I never found a new church home, and only attended worship services a handful of times in my four years at Pitt. When Erin and I moved away from Ruthfred in 2012 for my new job directing a pregnancy center in Harrisburg, it took us over a year to find a new church home.

While Connor and Kate have continued worshiping periodically at Ruthfred, they hadn't yet found a congregation near CMU or Pitt with whom to worship regularly or get involved. When Kate moved to Pitt this fall I naturally didn't see her at Ruthfred as often as I did when she lived at home. Before college she was here several times per week for worship and to participate in and lead youth ministry. When she moved we weren't in regular contact, though I'd often wonder how she was doing.

With 2021 drawing to a close I had one Sunday vacation day to use for the year. I contacted Kate to ask if she'd like to join my family and me in attending a worship service at my favorite Lutheran congregation in Oakland: First Trinity. Kate enthusiastically agreed. Her brother, Connor, said he'd like to join us too! Erin happened to mention to Don and Barb Roose that we'd be visiting First Trinity with Connor and Kate, and they asked to join us too.





Song of the Month

'Tis Good, Lord, to Be Here

Lyrics: Joseph A. Robinson Music: Johann S. Bach

There are many reasons to be happy about being Lutheran. The most important, of course, is that most Lutheran bodies continue to be stewards and proclaimers of the Gospel of salvation by grace alone, through faith in Christ alone, based on Scripture alone. There are other perks, however. Consider coffee and donuts, potluck suppers, solid teaching and preaching, and plenty of music and singing, just to name a few. Regarding the latter, how cool is it that the Lutheran heritage can lay claim to one who is generally regarded as the greatest composer of all time – Johann Sebastian Bach. Bach was also an extremely talented organist, harpsichordist, and expert in organ construction. With these things in mind, I thought it would be nice to feature a hymn this month by Herr Bach. I was torn, however. Considering how we are entering the Epiphany season, maybe it would be better to write about an Epiphany hymn. I decided to go with the Bach idea.

The first thing I then did was check the Composers index in the back of our SBH hymnal. There were 20 entries from which to choose – great! One by one, however, I found that the credit to Bach was for adapting, arranging, and/or harmonizing. A bit confused, I reached out to our own Bob Vogel for any insight he could provide on this. Here was his knowledgeable, thoughtful response:

"Bach is not remembered as a prolific composer of original hymn tunes. However, a Chorale is a German hymn, and Baker's Biographical Dictionary of Musicians lists over 200 Chorales for four voices to Bach's credit. In total, Bach reharmonized about 400 existing chorale melodies. Some movements of Bach's Church Cantatas were used as hymn tunes, but again, most would have been based on melodies that were already known such as *A Mighty Fortress* and *Wachet Auf*. Germans loved their Chorales, so Bach would write Chorale Preludes such as *Jesu Joy of Man's Desiring*, where the chorale tune was woven one line at a time into a newly composed and elaborate work.



Interestingly, Bach was so prolific as a composer that Beethoven commented, 'Not Brook (Bach is German for 'Brook') but Sea should be his name."

Pressing on, however, I did find a hymn in my old Missouri Synod hymnal credited to Bach – the melody that is. It's a simple, very singable hymn titled "'Tis Good, Lord, to Be Here". The lyrics are by Joseph A. Robinson, an English academic from the late 19th/early 20th centuries. His lyrics got paired with Bach's melody called 'Potsdam', probably so named from Bach's visit to Potsdam to meet with King Frederick II (later dubbed Frederick the Great).

By happy coincidence, the theme of "Tis Good" is the Transfiguration of Jesus, which happens to fall on the last Sunday of Epiphany. This hymn would thus satisfy both of my goals for this article! It is interesting to note, also, that apparently there are not very many hymns in existence devoted to the Transfiguration. This hymn may be one of very few. On the down side, however, it does not appear in our SBH or Ambassador hymnals, and so I fear not many of my readers may be familiar with it. Maybe our pastors would consider introducing it for Transfiguration Sunday.

Here are the prayerful lyrics:


'Tis good, Lord, to be here, Thy glory fills the night; Thy face and garments, like the sun, shine with unborrowed light.


