## "The Word of the Lord"

Recently Dr. Don Bierle was with us and presented "Surprised by Faith" during our Sunday School time. Dr. Bierle had grown up in a Lutheran church home, but had gone on to become an agnostic college professor of biology. However, God was at work and confronted him with the truths of the existence of God, and also of the truth of His Word. In his book, (in our church library!) "Surprised by Faith" Dr. Bierle gives a concise summary of the compelling evidence that the Bible (New Testament is his particular focus) is indeed God's inspired and inerrant Word, which has been divinely preserved throughout the centuries and demonstrates how we can have full confidence in it. There are three main tests/questions that scholars use to determine the reliability and integrity of an ancient text. The New Testament passes (and immensely exceeds!) these tests better than any ancient text in the entire world!

In brief they are:

- 1. How many manuscripts have been found?
- 2. How early are the manuscripts? And
- 3. How accurately were the manuscripts copied?

## 1. How many manuscripts have been found?

The "best" of ancient literature includes Homer's "Iliad" (1,757 copies found), Caesar's "Gallic Wars" (251 copies), Plato's "Tetralogies" (210 copies), and Aristotle (49 copies). These are standard readings for college courses and no doubts are presented about their authenticity. In contrast to these "gold standard" ancient writings, the New Testament shows itself to be in a class of its own: we now have 24,406 ancient manuscript copies of the New Testament! "There is no body of ancient literature in the world that enjoys such a wealth of good textual attestation as the New Testament." (p.36) Obviously, the more manuscripts, the better, as scholars can compare them all, and see if they are exactly the same, or if the message has been corrupted through the course of time.

## 2. How early are the manuscripts?

This is an important question, because if the accounts we have in our possession were actually written during the lifetime of the author, or author's followers, then we have good reason to be assured of their accuracy. If they were written long after, then we might have good cause to doubt if what we have is the authentic account of what they originally wrote.

The "best" of ancient literature reveals a staggering length of time gap that elapsed between the author and the earliest manuscript in our possession. There are as follows: Homer (400 year gap), Caesar (950 yr.), Plato (1,300 yr.), and Aristotle (1,450 yr.). Incredible! And yet, they are viewed as authentic, and without serious question, even though the gap between the life of the author and the earliest surviving manuscript is between 400–1,450 years! Amazingly, we have actual manuscript fragments and portions of the New Testament that date back to A.D. 50. Keep in mind that Jesus died around A.D. 30. This means that we have in our possession portions of the New Testament that were written down within just a few years after Jesus' death, and that the authors themselves might well have still been living while those (ones that we have!) manuscripts were in circulation in the early church. In fact, so extensively do the early church fathers quote (we have their writings!) from New Testament books, that it evidences the fact that those books were already widely circulated and well known by A.D. 100.

"No other ancient writing can trace its manuscript copies all the way back to the generation of the eyewitnesses and its original authors!" (p. 39)

#### 3. How accurately were the manuscripts copied?

The more numerous the manuscripts found, the more opportunity to find errors or distortions due to the copying process over the centuries. Again, it is God's Word that shines above all others in this third test! Even though we have over 24,000 manuscripts of the New Testament, in comparing them all, there is only a 0.2% distortion rate among them! Furthermore, this distortion affects no question of doctrine or historical fact of the Christian faith. No other ancient literature even comes close to the New Testament! I encourage you to check out Dr. Bierle's book, "Surprised by Faith."

# All Creatures of Our God and King

Lyrics: St. Francis of Assisi Music: Lasst Uns Erfreuen

Dr. Don Bierly recently gave two talks as a guest speaker here at our church. Citing Romans 1:18-20, he made the case that the specified complexity of the universe, and especially life, show clear evidence of design, not random chance. He also noted the amazing comprehensibility of God's creation, even to the point of being describable with elegant mathematical equations. Therefore the ungodly are "without excuse" in denying God's existence. The author of this month's featured song, "All Creatures of Our God and King," perhaps inspired by Psalm 148, takes this one step further. He calls upon the various aspects of creation to not only be dumb witnesses, but to find voice and actively praise God. He starts out with all creatures, but then proceeds to include the burning sun with golden beam, the silver moon with softer gleam, rushing wind so strong, clouds sailing along, rising morn, lights of evening, flowing water making music, and mother earth sprouting flowers and fruits. Mankind is not excluded: "all ye men of tender heart, forgiving others, take your part." Even death is included: "most kind and gentle death" [that] "leadest home the child of God, and Christ our Lord the way hath trod." Most of these voices of praise are metaphorical, of course. Or are they? Perhaps in some divinely mysterious way they are truly literal.

In the latter part of the 12th century (about the time Notre Dame cathedral was being built), in the town of Assisi in Italy, Giovanni Bernardone was born. His father, a wealthy cloth merchant, had just returned from a business trip to France. He was so enamored with all things French that he added the name Francesco to his son's baptized name. Giovanni Francesco grew up with the proverbial silver spoon in his mouth and lived a high-spirited life as a youth. But fairly early on, he began to be convicted by the Holy Spirit and to take the teachings of Jesus more and more seriously. After a confrontational incident with his father, he renounced all wealth and embraced a life of poverty, devotion, preaching, and service. Although he declined to pursue ordination as a priest, he gradually gained many followers who became known as "Franciscans." Giovanni Francesco, whom we now know as St. Francis of Assisi, was also known as a lover of animals and all nature. According to one legendary story, he was able to command a flock of noisy swallows to be quiet while he preached to a group of people on a hillside. For us life-long Lutherans, here are a few more interesting facts from St. Francis' life that we might not have known:

- He served in a military campaign against neighboring Perugia and served time as a prisoner-of-war.
- During the crusades, he got through the front lines of battle to visit the local Egyptian sultan to try to convert him to Christianity and end the hostilities.
- Francis is credited with starting the tradition of setting up creches as part of Christmas observances. His first one was actually a live nativity scene.
- The Franciscans are a group of mendicant religious orders that still exist to this day within the Catholic Church.

"In the year 1225, completely blind and nearing death, St. Francis of Assisi arrived at the Convent of St. Damian to bid goodbye to his dear friend, Sister Clara, the first woman to follow the call of St. Francis and take vows of the Order. Clara built him a small reed hut in the garden of her little monastery. It's said that at times St. Francis could be heard singing faint melodies from within the hut. It was at a meal with the sisters after having stayed for some time at the monastery that he wrote his famous text, "Canticle of the Sun," later paraphrased into the beloved hymn we sing today."
