**“Remember you are dust, and to dust you shall return . . . Repent and believe the Gospel.”**

Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of the Lenten Season. The entire Lenten Season is so rich in meaning as the journey prepares us for Easter. Until we understand the depth of our brokenness and death (both physical and spiritual) because of sin, we can't fully understand the wholeness and life we have in Christ because of His Good Friday death and Easter resurrection.

Ash Wednesday brings us back to the beginning of when sin came into the world as recorded in Genesis chapter three. When sin came, it brought with it the curse of death. God announced to Adam (and Eve), that they would no longer live forever, but now would die and “Return to the ground, because from it you were taken; for you are dust, and to dust you shall return.” (Gen. 3:19) That would have been the last word on the subject of our life (and eternal death), but thankfully, The WORD (Jesus) would come and die for us so that we might be resurrected to eternal life! In order for that to happen, we must honestly face our sin, our frailty, our death, and our dust. We need to “Repent and believe the Gospel.”

Jesus' first words in ministry (Gospel of Mark 1:15) were “Repent and believe the Gospel!” This means to be convicted of the seriousness of sin and to be turned from it and to be convinced of the salvation of the Good News of the Gospel and be turned to it. Both of those convictions and turnings are works of the Holy Spirit. May God be mightily at work in our soul!

Dust and ashes had long become a symbol in the ancient world—and continue to be today—of “repentance.” The Bible is filled with examples from the beginning books (Genesis, Job, etc.) of kings, prophets, and the peoples using sackcloth, dust, and ashes to demonstrate their sorrow and repentance. Job declared, “I repent in dust and ashes.” Daniel prayed to God “with fasting, sackcloth, and ashes.” The people in Nehemiah's day did the same as they called upon God for His forgiveness and blessing.

A number of our members at Ruthfred have requested ashes for many years. I am in favor of this and the church council is as well, so this year we are going to be offering the “imposition of ashes” on Ash Wednesday at each of our three services. You may choose (or not) to receive the ashes. They will be offered as one comes into the sanctuary, near the back by the chapel, during the prelude before the beginning of the service. The ashes will be applied on the forehead in the form of the cross. Today, as our society drifts farther away from Christ, the Church, and the Cross; this is a good visible symbol to others that we are a “people marked by the sign of the cross.”

Even as we face our sin, our frailty, our death, and our dust this Ash Wednesday; we also know that salvation, wholeness, resurrection, and life have come to us in Christ. Therefore, even at the gravesite we do proclaim, “Dust to dust; from the dust you were taken, to the dust you shall return; but one day from the dust you shall rise again!”

Let us make this Lenten Journey together as the people of God, marked by the cross of Christ,

## Council Highlights

February 11, 2019

- Pastor Carlson spoke about the annual conference and emphasized the need to know before the March council meeting who plans to attend.
- Imposition of ashes will be offered at the beginning of each Ash Wednesday service.
- Peggy Cox has graciously offered to be in charge of Soup & Sandwich Suppers from 6 to 7 PM each Wednesday in Lent. Teams of servers will be needed for each week.
- The Family Easter Festival will be held on Palm Sunday afternoon again this year, with Barb Harrold once again in charge.
- Chuck Morrison, treasurer, reported that donations in January were significantly less than in January 2018, probably the result of the inclement weather that prevented many from attending services.
- Gary Fischer moved to transfer \$5,000 from the Current Fund to the Benevolence Fund. Frank seconded; the motion passed.
- Gary Ausefski reported that he and Lou Angelo have been videoconferencing with Tim Beltz, church consultant, and have completed the first phase of information gathering. In the process, it has become clear that Ruthfred's policies and procedures need to be revamped. In light of Pastor Osier's acceptance of the position of Dean of AFLBS, concentration will be placed initially on the responsibilities of the assistant pastor so that they will be better defined when an assistant pastor is called.

## Song of the Month

### *Ah, Holy Jesus*

Lyrics: Johann Heermann

Music: Johann Cruger

As this edition of the Herald goes to press, we will be approaching the beginning of another Lenten season. Lent, the 40-day period of repentance and contemplation of our Savior's passion, is a tradition that dates back to the early years of the Christian church. Speaking of tradition, I enjoyed the articles in the latest Lutheran Ambassador magazine, especially the one by Joan Culler titled "Give Them Tradition." She describes how the raising of their children involved going to Sunday services as simply a fixture of life. Sometimes the weather was bad and sometimes they just didn't feel like going, but go they did. She then goes on to say: "Sunday services also walked us together through the seasons of the church and the life of Christ. There were joyous times and sad times, times to reflect and times to anticipate. Each season had its particular music and rituals. . . Lent was the time when flowers on the altar disappeared and songs became somber."

"Ah, Holy Jesus" has to rank as one of the most somber, meditative, and mournful hymns we sing during Lent. The poignant lyrics were written in 1630 by Johann Heermann, a Lutheran professor and pastor. The skillful English translation of the original German text that we have in our hymnal is by Robert Bridges. The excellently matched melody was composed ten years later by another Johann, Johann Cruger. Other composers have paid the ultimate compliment to the melody by incorporating it into some of their works, most notably a third Johann with the surname of Bach.

The hymn consists of a believer's extended conversation with his Savior. "Jesus—You who lived such a pure, blameless life—You who taught God's truths and healed so many—whom could You have possibly offended that You are being treated so cruelly? What have You done that You are being judged by rulers, derided by foes, and rejected by friends? What brought this upon You? Oh—it was me?—my sin? Alas, my treason, Jesus, hath undone Thee!"

Heermann's lyrics comprise one more attempt to plumb the mystery that lies at the core of Christianity. In his book, "What's So Great About Christianity?," Dinesh D'Souza makes this observation: "Mexican author Carlos Fuentes writes that when Christian missionaries first presented their doctrines to the Aztecs, the Aztecs were totally uncomprehending. Fuentes writes, 'In a universe accustomed to seeing men sacrificed to the gods, nothing amazed the Indians more than the sight of a god who had sacrificed himself to men.' Yet what other religions hold to be absurd and scandalous, Christianity holds to be true."

At the conclusion of each verse, Cruger's melody ends with a dramatic octave jump that emphasizes the accompanying words. In fact, if we extract and list together those verse-ending words, we see a concise summary of the entire hymn, not to mention the Gospel message itself!

O most afflicted.  
I crucified thee.  
God intercedeth.  
For my salvation.  
Not my deserving.

In August of 2016 the McMinn family began our “seminary adventure” at the Association Free Lutheran Theological Seminary (AFLTS) in Minnesota. At that time, we invited our friends and family members, including you at Ruthfred, to join us on this adventure by sending gifts to Ruthfred’s Seminary Scholarship Fund. This fund has helped to cover approximately \$38,000 in tuition costs.

Since then, our church family at Ruthfred has blessed us by covering well over \$12,000 of my tuition! God has also used our beloved Ruthfred family to help cover many other seminary costs for us. Erin, Noah, Elliot, Caleb, Lillian, Joshua, and I are grateful to report to you that as of today, with the last \$2,000 contribution Ruthfred made towards my tuition, ALL of our seminary tuition and housing expenses have been completely covered! Praise God!

Our family will leave the AFLTS campus in May to move up to Roseau, MN, where I’ll serve a one-year internship with Pastor Todd Erickson at the Rose and Spruce Free Lutheran congregations in Roseau. It’s encouraging that even with several months to go before we move off campus, and a year of internship before graduation in May of 2020, none of our seminary housing or tuition expenses remain to be covered. Thank you for everything you’ve done to bless us!

We love you, are grateful to God for all of you, and for how He has used you to bless us on our “seminary adventure!” We’re praying for you all, especially with the news of Pastor Osier coming to lead the Bible School in July. The Osiers will be an incredible blessing to the Bible School, and will certainly be missed at Ruthfred.
