"Christ Bears His Cross"

In high school I attended a special youth retreat where one of the evenings featured the stations of the cross. We were put into groups and went around the dimly-lit rooms of the church, where other youth were dressed in costume, silently demonstrating each part of the crucifixion story. This was a powerful experience for me as the crucifixion was laid out before me in vivid images.

Some years later I was a leader at this same retreat and was asked to act out one of the scenes. I was assigned "Jesus bears His cross." I knelt down on one knee with a 7-foot beam of wood across my back and a crown of thorns on my head. Group after group of youth would come by and hear John 19:16-17 read:

"So he delivered Him over to them to be crucified. So they took Jesus, and He went out, bearing His own cross, to the place called The Place of a Skull, which in Aramaic is called Golgotha."

I had learned a great deal seeing the stations the first time; that night holding that cross I experienced a deeper understanding yet. Over the course of the evening I was overcome with emotion, bearing the weight of this cross and contemplating those two verses over and over again—the hate that Jesus endured, the physical exhaustion, the ridicule and scorn, the weight of the world's sin.

I knew that as I began to shake under the weight of this cross after an hour, I had the assurance in my mind that I would eventually lay it down and I would join my friends later that night. But not Christ. His cross bearing led Him to a crucifixion, a gruesome death. I felt shame creeping into me as I considered what my Lord had endured and how little thought I had given toward the last hours of His life before burial.

Often when I think of Christ, I think of His miracles, I think of His teachings, I think of His parables, and I think of His resurrection and glory! But that night, for maybe the first time, I really contemplated His pain. What wondrous love that my savior would bear a cross for me, a wicked and ungrateful servant.

This contemplation of Christ's suffering and death is the purpose of our season of Lent. In a world that gives us cheap pleasures, and turns a blind eye to suffering, and demands instant gratification, it's easy to feel distance between yourself and this appalling death almost 2000 years ago. So at Lent we meet as a congregation every week to contemplate. We meet to remember. We meet to hear the Word of God. We are reminded of the sacrifice made by the One who chose not to take the easy way out, but to walk each and every painful step on the way to Calvary, and to take the piercing of nails in His hands and feet, and to die upon the cross. All of this suffering was to draw us to Him.

This Lent my prayer is that our church family would have the opportunity to turn from the noise and busyness of life and for some moments to dwell on the wondrous love of Christ displayed in the horrors of Golgotha. Yes, as Christians we celebrate each and every day the victory and joy of the Resurrection, as we should! The joy of Easter is that much more experienced when we understand the sorrow of Good Friday. Christ died. He died for you and He died for me. He bore His cross that you and I would be free. Praise be to Christ for His boundless love.

Song of the Month

Come, Thou Fount of Every Blessing

Lyrics: Robert Robinson
Music: Nettleton ((composer uncertain)

When Peggy and I attended Concordia College in New York back in the 70's, Dean Thomas Green was already a beloved fixture on campus: ordained pastor, confirmed bachelor, soft-spoken professor of English Literature, never seen wearing anything but his black clericals, and bald as a cue ball, back before bald was chie! I remember a chapel talk he gave one day in which he good-naturedly poked fun at the state of contemporary song lyrics, especially in the arena of romantic love. I don't recall his exact examples, but I believe he first quoted something like an excerpt from a Shakespearean sonnet. Then, using a dry monotone voice (not unlike his normal manner of speaking), he asked us to contrast that with a contemporary song that went something like this: "Oh baby, baby, I love you baby. Oh yeah, baby, baby!" His examples were perhaps a bit extreme, but his point was well taken with a ripple of chuckles throughout the auditorium.

I suppose it is a bit of a truism that the King's English has deteriorated and coarsened over the last couple of centuries. Perhaps that is why I really enjoy such older classic hymns like "Come, Thou Fount of Every Blessing." Written in 1758, the lyrics are rich in imagery, Biblical allusions, and poetic expression. Every phrase is packed with meaning, with no repetitions to give you time to unpack them!

Come, Thou Fount of ev'ry blessing, Tune my heart to sing Thy grace; Streams of mercy, never ceasing, Call for songs of loudest praise. Teach me some melodious sonnet, Sung by flaming tongues above. Praise the mount! I'm fixed upon it, mount of Thy redeeming love.



This hymn is not found in our SBH hymnal. I could not find it in my old 1941 Missouri Synod hymnal either. I don't really know why that might be, but one possible explanation is that Robinson's ministerial career and theological journey took him from conversion to Methodism closely associated with the Church of England to Calvinistic Independents to Baptists. Towards the end of his life, some even accused him of becoming too friendly with political and theological radicals, including Unitarians.



How much truth there is to the accusations that Robinson was "prone to wander" appears to be debated. But be that as it may, "Come, Thou Fount" was written when he was 22 and certainly reflects orthodox views of Christian faith. The hymn probably deserves two more articles, one just to discuss all of the hymn's theological content, and another to delve into Robinson's interesting life. But in the little space we have left, what's up with that "Ebenezer" line? **Here I raise my Ebenezer**, **Hither by Thy help I'm come.** This is a reference to the "stone of help" that Samuel set up after his prayers for deliverance from a Philistine attack were miraculously answered. Samuel then said, "Till now the Lord has helped us." (1 Samuel 7).

O to grace how great a debtor, Daily I'm constrained to be; Let Thy grace now like a fetter, Bind my wand'ring heart to Thee. Prone to wander, Lord, I feel it, Prone to leave the God I love; Here's my heart, O take and seal it, Seal it for Thy courts above.
