Dear Future Me,

Dear November 2020...and Beyond...Me:

"I can't wait until this election is over." "I can't wait until Covid 19 has passed." "I can't wait until we don't have to wear masks." "I can't wait until...blah, blah, blah...whatever."

While it's tempting to have these thoughts and say these things, don't be fooled, future me. The moment any of the things that currently irritate you, make you anxious, and otherwise distract you are gone, your spiritual foe WILL provide new replacement things, events, or looming "disasters" to distract you from God, His blessings, and all things of eternal value.

Why do we have to go over this again and again? When will you ever just trust God and stop being so easily distracted by everything the enemy uses to take your eyes off Jesus? I guess it's true, what Paul says in Philippians 3:12-14, that we haven't already attained to perfection in this life, and must press on. He also says in Galatians 5:17, our flesh "wars against the Spirit and the Spirit against the flesh." A spiritual battle is raging, not just around you, but within you. The sinner in you (your fallen nature) always rebels against the Holy Spirit; against trust in God.

eran Church, still son to Jim and Stephanie, and you still have other critical roles to fill, relationships to maintain, neighbors and enemies to love and for whom to pray, friends and family members with cancer who need prayers and healing, lonely and suffering people in your life and around your community and world who need help, you still know people facing scary surgeries and others who need comfort because of horrible things that have happened to them. You'll still need to continue on in and through all that by God's grace and to His glory.

Fact is, future me, no matter which politicians EVER win, how long ANY viruses or plagues last, or WHAT-EVER new insanities or crippling troubles come along to replace or add to the current lot, you'll STILL have more than you can handle just doing all the above things well without messing them up. You'll STILL need God to do it all through you, because you STILL won't be able to do any of it well in your own power. And God will STILL BE, "God of gods, Lord of kings...and Revealer of mysteries..." (Daniel 2:47).



Member Profile: Melissa Bostaph by Mettelise Ziegler

Melissa Bostaph can define herself in many different ways. She is a single mother; a former Roman Catholic; a long-time resident of Ruthfred Acres; a voracious student of the Bible and a special friend to our vicars and their wives. She is all these and more.

When Melissa was a child, she lived on Thornwood behind the ballfield at our church. Some of her fondest memories were of sliding down the red hot metal slide and swinging on the old style swings. Melissa married, eventually moving into a home on Turngate, not all that far from her childhood home.



Melissa is a single mother of seven. Her oldest, Emily, is 20. Anna Marie follows at 19. Michael is 17. Caitlyn is 15. Samuel is 13, followed by Lily who is 11 and Gabriel who just turned 9.

At some future time, Melissa may put the business degrees she earned at Duquesne and Robert Morris Universities to use outside the home. For now, Melissa is understandably busy with family.

Growing up in the neighborhood as she did, Melissa knew about Pastor Dennis. Back in the day, pastors often walked neighborhoods knocking on doors. Being a Roman Catholic, she never thought to visit. However, Melissa had a deep desire to read and study the Bible, something she was not encouraged to do at her church.

Melissa visited Ruthfred when her daughter Anna joined a theater group. Although Melissa found the church "lovely" she was not inspired to participate in any way until a van driven by Vicar Josh Skogerboe pulled up in front of her home with his sons enthusiastically delivering invitations to Vacation Bible School. "Why not?" she thought.

On the last day of Vacation Bible School that year, some of the women from Journey through the Word (JTTW) invited Melissa to attend on Wednesday mornings. At last, a chance to study the Bible!

Melissa has forged a strong friendship with many of the women. She regularly discusses JTTW lessons with Marcia Pavesi when her part time job at Ben Franklin Elementary School gets in the way of attending. Virginia DiSalvo invited Melissa to the first service she attended at Ruthfred. It was Good Friday, and the vulnerable way that men like Kurt Ziegler shared their messages moved her to tears. That day, Melissa found her church home.

Melissa has been a member of Ruthfred since November of 2016. She typically attends the 11:00 am service. She just started teaching Sunday School this year. Her personal ministry is to extend hospitality to our vicars so they feel at home in Bethel Park. She has stayed in weekly contact with every vicar's wife since the Skogerboe's. Melissa is godmother to Aaron and Michelle Olson's son Olen.

One Bible verse has extra special meaning to Melissa. "My grace is sufficient for you, for my power is made perfect in weakness." (2 Corinthians 12:9). This is certainly an appropriate verse for a woman who wears many hats in her daily walk with God.

Song of the Month

Come, Ye Thankful People, Come

In C.S. Lewis' "The Magician's Nephew", there is a scene in which a Cabby (as in driver of a horse-drawn cab) and his passengers suddenly find themselves in what seems a dark, inhospitable place. With his Cockney accent the Cabby proceeds to say "If you ask me, I think the best thing we could do to pass the time would be to sing a 'ymn." The passage continues as follows: "And he did. He struck up at once a harvest thanksgiving hymn, all about crops being 'safely gathered in.' It was not very suitable to a place which felt as if nothing had ever grown there since the beginning of time, but it was the one he could remember best. He had a fine voice and the children joined in; it was very cheering. Uncle Andrew and the Witch did not join in."

Probably most of us are like the Cabby in that we are at least familiar with "Come, Ye Thankful People, Come". It may in fact be the most popular Thanksgiving hymn we have in our tradition. For that we are thankful to Henry Alford and George Elvey. Alford was an Anglican cleric in a long line of clergymen. "He was a versatile man: an artist, an organist and singer, composer of verses and a very talented speaker. His literary ability was climaxed with the completion of The Greek Testament, a commentary of four volumes, which required 20 years of hard labor." (staugustine.com) Elvey was also a very talented and accomplished man. A graduate of the Royal Academy of Music in London, he became organist and chorus master at St. George's Chapel, Windsor. From that platform he gained considerable popularity with both the English people and its royalty, and was often selected to provide music for royal occasions. Today he is best known for two of his hymn tunes: "Come, Ye Thankful" and "Crown Him With Many Crowns".

Come, ye thankful people, come, Raise the song of harvest home; All is safely gathered in Ere the winter storms begin; God our Maker doth provide For our wants to be supplied: Come, to God's own temple come, Raise the song of harvest home.

This first verse deals with a literal harvest. We city dwellers easily lose a palpable connection to the experience and importance of agriculture and harvesting. As someone who struggles to grow grass and an occasional flower, I truly marvel at the miracle of growth that comes from God and the talents that he gives those who labor to keep our grocery stores and restaurants stocked. All it takes is a drive out into the country, as Peggy and I did this past month, to be reminded of our dependence on the land and those who work it.

If you're not paying close attention, you might miss the fact that the remaining three verses of this hymn shift gears and speak about a spiritual harvest. Alluding to Jesus' parable of the wheat and tares, these

verses pray that we might be "wholesome grain" and "fruitful ears", and that we will some day be gathered into the eternal harvest-home of God's presence. The final verse actually provides an excellent segue to the eschatological themes of the imminent season of Advent.

Even so, Lord, quickly come To thy final harvest-home; Gather thou thy people in, Free from sorrow, free from sin.

Returning to the first verse again, we see it starts with the invitation for thankful people to "Come". Come where? To "God's own temple". If you are physically able, and comfortable enough with the Covid risks, join us this Thanksgiving, and every Sunday, to "raise the song" with your fellow Christian pilgrims!
