From the Pastor's Desk

Do you "Honor thy father and thy mother...?"

The 4th Commandment says, "Honor thy father and thy mother, that thy days may be long upon the land which the Lord thy God giveth thee."

Martin Luther said that means, "We should fear and love God so that we do not despise our parents and superiors, nor provoke them to anger, but honor, serve, obey, love, and respect them."

It helps us understand the Commandments to examine examples of breaking them. I'll share some personal experience with the 4th. My Dad is my hero. I love and respect him. He's been through some intensely difficult things, especially as a Vietnam veteran, that are beyond my imagination. His experiences have left their mark on him. He loves my two brothers and me, and freely communicates with us, including when he disagrees with our decisions. When Dad thinks correction may be needed, he often says something like, "You don't have to agree with me or do what I say. But let me tell you something..."

What follows may not always be communicated with complete gentility. I remember times when my response to my Dad's somewhat less than gentle approach fell far short of the love, honor, servant's heart, obedience, and respect God commands me to show him. To his credit, my Dad is a forgiving man.

Not all parents are equal. In fact, some are cruel, abusive, and evil. For people with parents like that, keeping the 4th Commandment looks different from what it looks like for me to keep it. If you're struggling with parents like that, contact me. I'd be honored to walk with you through that.

Those of us who are blessed with honorable (though imperfect) parents still struggle to keep the 4th Commandment. When was the last time you called Mom or Dad, or visited? Do they need anything from you? Do you even know?

The ancient Hebrew language of the Old Testament has no word for grandfather or grandmother. If you lived then, you called your grandfather "father," and your grandmother "mother." They were due double honor, because they're the parents of your parents. They were to be esteemed and treasured. No family business was considered "none of their business." If God hadn't used them to bring your family into existence, you'd have no family or business at all.

If your parents or the parents of your parents had opinions about the way you raised your children, they could share them. That wasn't considered "sticking their noses into your business."

Some twenty-first century American views on family, parents, and grandparents are not only unbiblical, they're downright sinful. We don't have to agree with everything our parents and grandparents say. That's not the point of the 4th Commandment. But it does say, "*Honor thy father and thy mother*." It does not add exceptions like, "*unless they hurt your feelings, share opinions you don't like, or otherwise annoy you.*"

If I were to choose, as many sadly do, to refuse to speak with my Dad or lash out at him when he communicates honestly with me about things in a harsher way than I'd prefer, or about things that twenty-first century American culture says are "none of his business," I'm breaking the 4th Commandment. If I refuse to visit him, call him, help him when he needs help, or listen respectfully to him even when I disagree, I'm breaking the 4th Commandment. If I break the 4th Commandment, I sin not only against my parents, but against God Himself. Only Christ's blood can save us from the consequences of that.

I've learned and continue to learn some humbling things, by God's grace. For one, I've learned that my relationship with my parents is more enjoyable when I don't feel the need to point it out every time I disagree with them. Generally, unless someone specifically asks for your opinion, it probably isn't of any interest (Perish the thought! GASP!), nor of any help to them. That's hard for us to accept. Social media tempts our generation into the delusion that our opinion is inherently valuable and interesting. Social media distorts reality.

Remember, I likely know very little about your family relationships. This article is not an attempt to publicly scold or rebuke you personally, even if you haven't called your Mom lately, and she secretly hopes I wrote this with you in mind. I'm a sinner, like you. I fail, like you. Praise God, I'm saved by grace through faith in my Savior, Jesus! God's 4th Commandment is a guide for me in my relationship with my parents.



I need His guidance! If the 4th Commandment is especially challenging for you, contact me. I'll walk with you.

Like me, my Dad isn't perfect, but I know he loves me. He's shown me often. Here's one way: he texted this picture to me, which he took of me walking to Ruthfred with Pastors Nathan and Brent Olson. His text said, "I'm proud of you."

However old you get, nothing hits you like Dad saying he's proud of you. Dads, have you told your kids?

Sons of the month

God Leads Us Along Lyrics and Music: George A. Young

For this month's song article I have chosen yet another hymn with which I was unfamiliar. Perhaps you know it, however. As I may have mentioned in a previous article, part of my morning routine is to flip the page on three devotional daily calendars we have displayed on a hutch in the dining room, one of which was a gift from Jeen and Rick Harper. The October 4th page on that one featured excerpts from "God Leads Us Along". The chorus in particular struck a chord with me:

Some through the waters, some through the flood, Some through the fire, but all through the blood; Some through great sorrow, but God gives a song, In the night season and all the day long.



I decided to research this hymn that I had never heard before. First off, unlike many of the old favorites we love to sing, this one dates post 19th century, although not by much as it was written in 1903. A quick Internet search revealed multiple performances by many different performers in various styles and with various kinds of instrumental accompaniment. Apparently the hymn was more popular than I had supposed. I also discovered that it is included in the AFLC Ambassador hymnal. The verses, especially the first, appear to be loosely based on the 23rd Psalm.



In shady green pastures, so rich and so sweet, God leads His dear children along; Where the water's cool flow bathes the weary one's feet, God leads His dear children along.

The glory of poetry, of course, is that it effectively uses imagery, rhythm, rhyme, and concise phrasing to convey thoughts, feelings, and ideas. It is left to the less talented among us to try to clumsily unpack its meaning. Going back to the chorus again, here is my take on it: Everyone in this world experiences trials and tribulations to some degree. Some are mild, symbolized by "waters". Some are more severe, symbolized by "flood". Others may be extreme, hence "fire". For Christians, however, we cling to the promise that God will bring us through them all through the blood of His Son. God also promises to be along side us throughout. In Psalm 23 it is with His rod and staff that we are comforted. In "God Leads Us" it is with a song that He provides.


Not much seems to be known about George Young, who composed both the lyrics and music. The following paragraph from one particular website summarizes what little there is to know:

"Young was an obscure 19th century preacher and carpenter who spent a lifetime serving in small rural communities. Often his financial support was small, and it was hard on his family. But through all the ups and downs his faithful wife never wavered in her loyalty to God and to her husband. After a long struggle, the family was able to move into their own small home (which George built himself). But then, on an occasion when George was away preaching, some local thugs – who didn't like his Gospel preaching – set fire to the house, and it was totally destroyed. It was out of that experience that Young reaffirmed his faith in God by writing 'God Leads Us Along'." [thecontinuingwitness.com]

If, like me, you are not familiar with this hymn, check out some of the renditions on the Internet. Also, there is a possibility it might show up as special music at one of our upcoming services.




