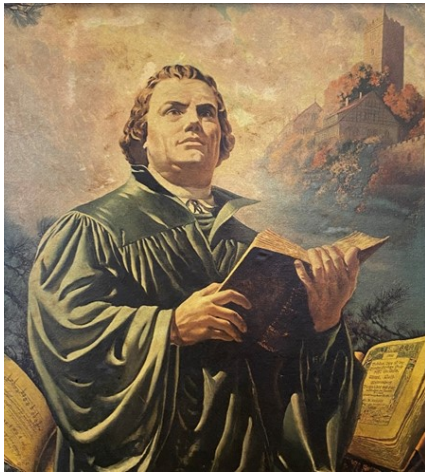




From the Pastor's Desk

The Catechism: It's NOT Just for Middle Schoolers, Ya Know?



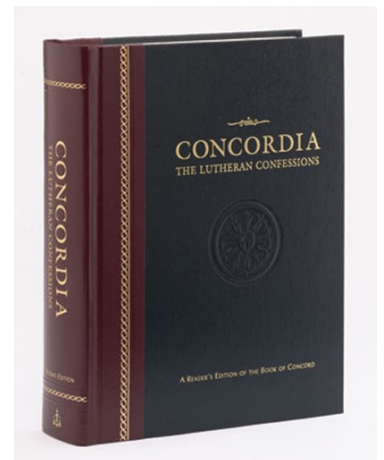
Five years after being excommunicated by the Pope for upholding the teachings of Scripture against many unbiblical, horrible teachings that were spreading throughout the Church, Dr. Martin Luther and other Reformers visited congregations around Germany to check on their overall spiritual health. Among other things, Luther said this in response to what he saw in the churches: *"The deplorable, miserable condition I discovered...has forced me to prepare this catechism. Mercy! Dear God, what great misery I beheld! Everyone says they're Christians, even though they can't even recite the Lord's Prayer or the Creed or the Ten Commandments. They live like dumb brutes and irrational hogs. Now that the Gospel has come, they have nicely learned to abuse all freedom like experts."*

That's just the start of what Luther said on the subject. He goes on for many more powerful (if also entertaining) paragraphs in his prefaces to the Small and Large Catechisms, which you'll find starting on pages 313 and 351 respectively in your copy of *Concordia: The Lutheran Confessions*. Don't have a copy of that book yet? I've got a FREE copy for you in my office. Check with me. I'll get it to you.

It's fall now, and confirmation classes are going strong here at Ruthfred. I'm reminded these days that Luther's Small Catechism is NOT just for confirmation students!

What Luther said 500 years ago about the Small Catechism is sadly true today:

"Many see the catechism as a poor, common teaching, which they can read through once and immediately understand. They can throw the book into a corner and be ashamed to read it again. But for myself, I am as learned and experienced as all the people who have such assumptions and contentment. Yet I act as a child who is being taught the catechism. Every morning, and whenever I have time, I read and say word for word the Ten Commandments, the Creed, the Lord's Prayer, the Psalms, and such. I must still read and study them daily. Yet I cannot master the catechism as I wish. I must remain a child and pupil of the catechism, and am glad to remain so. Therefore, for God's sake, I beg such lazy bellies or arrogant saints to be persuaded and believe that they are truly, truly not so learned or such great doctors as they imagine! They should never assume that they have finished learning the parts of the catechism or know it well enough in all points, even though they think they know it ever so well."

We should all learn and study it. No one, especially pastors, should arrogantly kid themselves that they know it well enough, and set it on a shelf the rest of our lives after we've been "confirmed." Test yourself. Write the Ten Commandments in order. Can you do it?

Stop when you've taught the devil to death, and have become more learned than God Himself and all His saints. May God grant His grace! Amen."*

Song of the Month

LORD, TEACH US HOW TO PRAY

Lyrics: James Montgomery

Music: William Henry Havergal

On the first Sunday in September we sang a hymn I was unfamiliar with: "Lord, Teach Us How to Pray." The melody was simple and easy to sing, and the words made an impression on me. Maybe it's because I've always had a problem understanding the concept of prayer. If God already knows all of our needs, why do we need to ask Him? If things turn out the way we want when we pray God gets all the credit, but if they don't, God doesn't get any blame. If God hears and answers our prayers, why is it sometimes such a guessing game figuring out what the answer is? But I continue to pray anyway. Why? Mainly because God's Word teaches that we should. All the godly people in the Bible, including Jesus himself, encouraged and modeled the practice of prayer. Add to that the billions of godly people now and throughout history who have fervently practiced prayer. As the second part of verse 1 of "Lord, Teach Us" says, "Though dust and ashes in thy sight, we may, we must draw near!" Then the 2nd verse starts out with "We perish if we cease from prayer."

Montgomery's lyrics may not answer all the mysteries surrounding prayer, but they do offer some very powerful advice about it. The 7th and final verse starts out with the statement, "Give these, and then Thy will be done." Unless you paid close attention to the previous four verses, you might wonder what the "these" refers to. To summarise concisely, here's a list:

- * Truth in the inward parts;
- * Deep humility and godly sorrow;
- * Strong desire to hear God's voice;
- * Faith in the only sacrifice [i.e. Christ's] that can atone for sin;
- * Patience, courage, and trust.



The 6th stanza particularly caught my attention:

***Patience to watch and wait and weep,
Though mercy long delay;
Courage our fainting souls to keep,
And trust thee though thou slay.***

The allusions to Job are almost unmistakable. The "patience of Job" is a well-known aphorism. Then, in Job 13:15a, Job is quoted as saying: "Though he [God] slay me, I will hope in him."

One aspect of prayer that Montgomery does not really touch upon is honesty with God. Consider the second half of Job 13:15 where Job goes on to say, "Yet I will argue my ways to his face."

In closing, here are some interesting tidbits about the composer and the lyricist. William Havergal was an Anglican clergyman, and also father of Frances Havergal, composer of "Take My Life and Let It Be" and "On Our Way Rejoicing." James Montgomery also wrote "Go to Dark Gethsemane".

Pour out your heart to God. The One who sweat blood in the Garden of Gethsemane understands.
