From the Pastor's Desk

Sundry Notes:

Dear Congregational Family,

As we enter the fall season, I want to highlight several different things. These past two years have been extremely full and challenging for a number of reasons. It's hard to believe that we have now lived with Covid-19 for over 18 months and it still continues to impact our daily lives. I am very thankful for how our congregation on has weathered that storm and I am confident that we will continue to do so. Most things have returned to "normal" but some things never will. That's ok. Life is filled with change!

Back to Church: Did you know that September is actually "Back to Church Month?" Some churches pick a certain week to emphasize that, but regardless of the Sunday, the fall season offers a great opportunity for you to invite people to church with you and help them to prioritize their life and schedules in a way that nourishes their souls. If you have not (and are able to) made it back to the sanctuary since Covid-19 hit, now would be a great time for a new start! We are grateful for the livestream option, and we will continue it, but "in person community" with other Christians is so important for us. God designed us to be together from the very beginning, even stating that "it is not good for the man to be alone." That did not just apply to marriage, but it is a general truth. We need one another. Hebrews 10:25 also strongly exhorts us to "not forsake the assembling together, as is the habit of some, but encouraging one another, and all the more as you see the day [of Christ's return] drawing near." It does seem like that DAY is indeed drawing near!

The Suffering Church: Afghanistan is certainly in the news every minute. Our hearts are grieved beyond words to think of the suffering inflicted upon our brothers and sisters in Christ who are being hunted down and brutally abused and executed. Hebrews 13:3 reminds us to "Remember the prisoners, as though in prison with them, and those who are ill-treated." This has certainly been a year that has witnessed a dramatic increase of persecution of Christians around the world, especially in China, North Korea, India, Cuba, etc. We kneel in prayer for these dear members of the body of Christ. Song of the Month

Breathe on Me, Breath of God

Lyrics: Edwin Hatch Music: Robert Jackson



References to God's breath and/or act of breathing is found throughout Scripture. Sometimes it is a positive thing, such as when God breathes life into Adam in Genesis 2:7, or when His breath is the creative agent that brought the heavens into existence (Psalm 33:6). Another example might be II Timothy 3:16 which describes all Scripture as "breathed out by God". Other times, however, God's breath is not to be desired. "The grass withers, the flower fades when the breath of the Lord blows on it; surely the people are grass," writes Isaiah (40:7). In the fourth chapter of Job, Eliphaz declares concerning evildoers that "by the breath of God they perish, and by the blast of his anger they are consumed."

In all references such as these, I would venture to say that God's 'breath' or 'breathing' is used in a metaphorical sense. There is one instance, however, where it seems that this action is meant quite literally! In the twenthieth chapter of John's Gospel he describes how Jesus miraculously appeared to His disciples following His resurrection. He writes, "Jesus said to them again, 'Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, even so I am sending you.' And when he had said this, he breathed on them and said to them, 'Receive the Holy Spirit.'" Since Jesus demonstrated that He was present with a physical body by eating fish and having Thomas touch his crucifixion wounds, this was apparently a physical breathing! It is this passage that Edwin Hatch almost certainly had in mind when he composed "Breathe on Me, Breath of God".

In our SBH hymnal, this hymn appears in "The Inner Life" section. If our hymnal had a "Sanctification" section, however, it might more appropriately go there. Luther's catechism teaches that our sanctification is the work chiefly of the Holy Spirit, and Hatch's hymn is essentially a prayer by a believer for God's breath, or Spirit, to work its will in his or her life. The hymn prays for God's Breath to fill us with life anew, so that we:

- Love what He loves;
- Do what He would have us do;
- Have our hearts purified;
- Will what He wills;
- Glow with His divine fire;
- Ultimately live the perfect life with Him in eternity!



"The simplicity of this profound hymn belies the education and knowledge of its author ... Educated at Pembroke College, Oxford, Hatch ministered in an Anglican parish in the slums of London before accepting a position at Trinity College in Quebec where he taught classics. After serving as Rector of Quebec High School, he returned to Oxford to become the vice-principal of St. Mary's Hall, and took several posts including the Bampton Lecturer, Reader in Ecclesiastical History, and the Hibbert Lecturer."

An Appeal from Pastor Grimenstein On Behalf of the Zion Lutheran Sunday School

Pastor Grimenstein is pastor of Zion Lutheran Church in Bridgeville, PA. This article appeared in Zion's August newsletter and is being reprinted here with his permission. Although addressed to his congregation, it is a good "epistle" to Christian churches everywhere.

I never went to church as a kid. I'm not lying, and I'm not exaggerating. I never set foot into the sanctuary of a church until I was about 13 years old. I didn't know what an altar was. I never saw an advent wreath. I had no idea what a baptismal font was much less what it was used for (I was actually baptized in a hospital). I never went to church as a kid. I'm not lying, and I'm not exaggerating . . . but I did have faith in Jesus Christ. You might ask yourself, "How did that happen?" Well, the answer is simple . . . I was sent to Sunday School.

Even though I never set foot into a sanctuary, I heard the gospel every Sunday from faithful teachers who took the time to share the faith with a wayward child like myself. The members of my home congregation, Redeemer Lutheran in Oakmont, still speak about those days. I didn't realize it as a young child, but they were so excited to see the "little blonde boy come to Sunday School" (yes, I was blonde back then and had more hair than I do today). The teachers affectionately called me "little Eddie."

Those Sunday School teachers remember me, but I also remember them. I remember Mrs. Stancliffe who taught us to memorize the 10 commandments when we were just in 1st grade. I remember Mrs. Johnson in 4th grade who taught us of God's judgment in the flood of Noah, but God's mercy in the cross (to this day I can still see in my mind the pictures from that CPH lesson we studied). And I fondly remember Mrs. Julius who taught us in the turbulent age of 6th grade. Armed with her compassionate nature and faithful devotion to Christ, she taught us to rely upon Christ as we stepped across the threshold of childhood and into adolescence.

I remember all of them. And I remember what all of them taught me – they proclaimed to me Christ crucified for my sins, and Christ's resurrection for my eternal life. I never went to Church as a kid, not until confirmation. But I entered confirmation as a believing teenager because I had Sunday School teachers willing to share the faith with "Little Eddie"; a boy who never even came to church. We never know what the seed of God's Word can do!

Zion Lutheran is preparing to start Sunday School this coming year on September 12th. By my estimation we have an amazing group of 37 children coming to our Sunday School! In an age when a lot of LCMS churches would be ecstatic to even break double digits in their Sunday School we have 37. Praise be to God!


Although we have 37 children coming to hear God's Word, at the current moment, we only have 5 teachers. To operate our Sunday School program so that teachers can share responsibilities and still attend Adult Bible Study from time to time, we need at the very minimum 2 more teachers.

I know a lot of these children come to church, but some of them don't. We have quite a few "Little Eddies" in our Sunday School. Won't you please consider giving some of your time, tithing some of your time, as an offering to God so that the Christian faith can be nourished in our younger generations? Our children

could use you, in fact, I will go so far as to say our children NEED you. Thank you for considering as we walk together in the sharing of the gospel to this dying world!

Pastor's Report:

- * Pastor Carlson noted that VBS had 160 children in attendance and \$2,000 was collected for Samaritan's Purse.
- * Pastor commented that Paula did a good job training Sally who is doing a great job in her new position.
- * He is grateful for Pat Lutz and all she has done the past four years. A Committee will be formed to hire a new Parish Assistant. The position title changed from Administrative Assistant. The new position will be a relational job, a community outreach person, volunteer coordinator, someone to reach out to new families. This person will grow the church internally and externally. The position will be posted in the bulletin on Sunday.

Youth Report:

- * Pete Huwe reported that Regan will arrive on the 28th with his parents who are staying for a few days. He is in a youth apprentice program with Jason Holt which he will continue online.
- * The youth committee is doing a good job coordinating events in Brandon's absence.
- * The youth room needs updating. There will be an announcement in the bulletin letting people know there is a need for donations for new furniture.
- * A motion was passed to form a youth committee including the following; Pete and Jill Huwe, Don and Barb Roose, Eric and Kris Wente, Shane and Kate Cox and John and Denise Stutzman. The role of the youth committee is to support the youth director and youth activities.
