

- ◆ Since her opening service on Christmas Eve in 1948 and her charter the following year, Ruthfred Lutheran Church has been a congregation rooted in the conviction that the Bible is inspired by God, living and active, capable to produce faith in its hearers, and true and faithful in all its parts. As such, our preaching and teaching aim to be faithful to its correct interpretation and is central to our worship of God.
- ♦Our Divine Service, called the "Common Service," possesses a rich history that stems from the early days of the Lutheran Reformation. Pastor (P): We open this service in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

Congregation (C): Amen

The Reading of Abraham Lincoln's Thanksgiving Proclamation

It has seemed to me fit and proper that (the gracious gifts of God) should be solemnly, reverently and gratefully acknowledged as with one heart and one voice by the whole American People. I do therefore invite my fellow citizens in every part of the United States, and also those who are at sea and those who are sojourning in foreign lands, to set apart and observe the last Thursday of November next, as a day of Thanksqiving and Praise to our beneficent Father who dwelleth in the Heavens. And I recommend to them that while offering up the ascriptions justly due to Him for such singular deliverances and blessings, they do also, with humble penitence for our national perverseness and disobedience, commend to His tender care all those who have become widows, orphans, mourners or sufferers in the lamentable civil strife in which we are unavoidably engaged, and fervently implore the interposition of the Almighty Hand to heal the wounds of the nation and to restore it as soon as may be consistent with the Divine purposes to the full enjoyment of peace, harmony, tranquillity and Union.

O say can you see, by the dawn's early light, What so proudly we hailed at the twilight's last gleaming. Whose broad stripes and bright stars, thro' the perilous fight, O'er the ramparts we watched were so gallantly streaming. O say does that Star-Spangled Banner yet wave

The Confession of Sins (SBH, p. 15)

Together:

O almighty God, most merciful Father, I, a poor miserable sinner confess unto Thee all my sins and iniquities, whereby I have offended Thee and justly deserved Thy temporal and eternal punishment; but I am heartily sorry for them all and repent of them truly, and I beseech Thee through Thine infinite mercy and for the sake of the holy, innocent, bitter suffering and death of Thy dear Son Jesus Christ to be gracious and merciful to me a poor sinner. Amen

The Absolution:

P: Almighty God, our heavenly Father, has had mercy upon us, and has given His only-begotten son to die for us, and for His sake forgives us all our sins. To those who believe on His name, He gives the power to become children of God, and bestows upon them His Holy Spirit. The one who believes and is baptized shall be saved. Grant this O Lord, unto us all.

C: Amen

We confess our sins at the beginning of each service, because we are coming into the presence of a holy God. Though we are sinners who daily struggle with sin, we are invited to come to Him to receive the forgiveness of sin earned for us by Jesus. Through this forgiveness, we are given a right standing before a holy God. Because sin is both corporate and personal, we confess our sins together, and privately in the silence of our hearts.

The Absolution is based upon God's instruction in Luke 24:47 that repentance and the forgiveness of sins should be widely proclaimed in the name of Jesus. (See also 1 John. 1:9).

"Introit" means "to enter into," and is a responsive reading meant to lead God's forgiven children into the worship of Him. The words are from Scripture, and relate to the theme of the day in the liturgical calendar.

The Introit (Read Responsively; Please stand)

P: Let every thing that hath breath praise the Lord.

C: Praise ye the Lord. Praise Him for His mighty acts.

P: Praise Him according to His excellent greatness. Praise ye the Lord. Praise God in His sanctuary.

C: Praise Him in the firmament of His power. (Psalm 150: 1, 2, 6)

The Gloria Patri (Sung in Unison; SBH p. 17)

Glory be to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Ghost; As it was in the beginning is now and ever shall be, world without end. Amen.

The Old Testament Lesson: 1 Chronicles 16:29-36 (NASB)

²⁹ Ascribe to the LORD the glory due His name; Bring an offering, and come before Him; Worship the LORD in holy array. ³⁰ Tremble before Him, all the earth; indeed, the world is firmly established, it will not be moved. ³¹ Let the heavens be glad, and let the earth rejoice; and let them say among the nations, "The LORD reigns." ³² Let the sea roar, and all it contains; let the field exult, and all that is in it. ³³ Then the trees of the forest will sing for joy before the LORD; for He is coming to judge the earth. ³⁴ O give thanks to the LORD, for *He is* good; for His lovingkindness is everlasting. ³⁵ Then say, "Save us, O God of our salvation, and gather us and deliver us from the nations, to give thanks to Your holy name, and glory in Your praise." ³⁶ Blessed be the LORD, the God of Israel, from everlasting even to everlasting. Then all the people said, "Amen," and praised the LORD.

<u>The Psalm:</u> Psalm 107:1-15, 19-21, 35-37, 31 (NASB)

P: Oh give thanks to the LORD, for He is good, for His lovingkindness is everlasting.

C: Let the redeemed of the LORD say so, whom He has redeemed from the hand of the adversary and gathered from the lands, from the east and from the west, from the north and from the south.

P: They wandered in the wilderness in a desert region; they did not find a way to an inhabited city.

C: *They were* hungry and thirsty; their soul fainted within them.

P: Then they cried out to the LORD in their trouble; He delivered them out of their distresses.

The Psalm: Psalm 107:1-15, 19-21, 35-37, 41, 31 (NASB) (cont'd)

C: He led them also by a straight way, to go to an inhabited city.

P: Let them give thanks to the LORD for His lovingkindness, and for His wonders to the sons of men!

C: For He has satisfied the thirsty soul, and the hungry soul He has filled with what is good.

P: There were those who dwelt in darkness and in the shadow of death, prisoners in misery and chains, because they had rebelled against the words of God and spurned the counsel of the Most High.

C: Therefore He humbled their heart with labor; they stumbled and there was none to help.

P: Then they cried out to the LORD in their trouble; He saved them out of their distresses.

C: He brought them out of darkness and the shadow of death and broke their bands apart.

P: Let them give thanks to the LORD for His lovingkindness, and for His wonders to the sons of men!

C: Then they cried out to the LORD in their trouble; He saved them out of their distresses.

P: He sent His word and healed them, and delivered *them* from their destructions.

C: Let them give thanks to the LORD for His lovingkindness, and for His wonders to the sons of men!

P: He changes a wilderness into a pool of water and a dry land into springs of water;

C: And there He makes the hungry to dwell, so that they may establish an inhabited city, and sow fields and plant vineyards, and gather a fruitful harvest.

P: But He sets the needy securely on high away from affliction, and makes *his* families like a flock.

C: Let them give thanks to the LORD for His lovingkindness, and for His wonders to the sons of men!

The Epistle Lesson: 1 Thessalonians 5:15-18 (NASB)

¹⁵ See that no one repays another with evil for evil, but always seek after that which is good for one another and for all people. ¹⁶ Rejoice always; ¹⁷ pray without ceasing; ¹⁸ in everything give thanks; for this is God's will for you in Christ Jesus.

The "Gradual" (Latin for step) is a liturgical reading bridging the readings of the epistle and the Gospel. It is comprised of Scripture, mostly the Psalms.

"Alleluia" is Hebrew for "Praise the Lord."

The Gradual:

The eyes of all wait upon you and you give them their meat in due season. You open your hand and satisfy the desire of every living thing. Alleluia, alleluia. Bless the Lord, O my soul, and all that is within me. Bless his holy Name. Bless the Lord, O my soul, and forget not all his benefits. Alleluia. (Psalm 145: 15, 16; Psalm 103: 1, 2)

The Alleluia (Sung in Unison)

Alleluia! Alleluia! Alleluia!

The Holy Gospel Lesson: Luke 17:11-19 (NASB)

The Congregation shall rise and sing, "Glory be to Thee, O Lord."

¹¹ While He was on the way to Jerusalem, He was passing between Samaria and Galilee. ¹² As He entered a village, ten leprous men who stood at a distance met Him; ¹³ and they raised their voices, saying, "Jesus, Master, have mercy on us!" ¹⁴ When He saw them, He said to them, "Go and show yourselves to the priests." And as they were going, they were cleansed. ¹⁵ Now one of them, when he saw that he had been healed, turned back, glorifying God with a loud voice, ¹⁶ and he fell on his face at His feet, giving thanks to Him. And he was a Samaritan. ¹⁷ Then Jesus answered and said, "Were there not ten cleansed? But the nine—where are they? ¹⁸ Was no one found who returned to give glory to God, except this foreigner?" ¹⁹ And He said to him, "Stand up and go; your faith has made you well."

The Congregation shall sing, "Praise be to Thee, O Christ."

The Explanation, First Article of the Creed:

I believe that God has created me and all that exists: that He has given and still preserves to me, my body and soul, my eyes and ears, and all my members, my reason and all the powers of my soul, together with food and raiment, home and family and all my property; that He daily provides abundantly for all the needs of my life, protects me from all danger, and guards, and keeps me from all evil, and that He does this purely out of fatherly and divine goodness and mercy, without any merit or worthiness in me for all which I am in duty bound to thank, praise, serve, and obey Him. This is most certainly true.

Come to God's own temple, come, raise the song of harvest home.


